International Bible Lesson for To-morrow—Riot of Ephesus—Acts 19, 29-40.

Golden Text—"The Lord preserveth the faithful."

A great spiritual awakening is followed by a religious riot led by Demetrius and the craftsmen who manufactured silver shrines for the worship of their great image of the Goddess Diana, the patron deity of Ephesus. These men found the gospel Paul preached injured their business and they were losing money, for multitudes of people turned from dumb idols to serve the living God. Paul's companions were caught and hustled into the immense, roofless theatre, seating about 25,000. Paul, against whom the charge was made, bravely sought to rescue them, but his friends prevent him entering. The Jews must have a hand in to clear themselves, but make things worse, and the war cry of the mob for two hours drowned everything else. Well for the city it was under Roman law—well for us we are under British rule—a chief officer brings the mob to their senses, reads the riot act—after a fashion—and with wise words quells the uproar and dismisses them from the theatre.

The religion of Jesus Christ is the foe of every wrong business and is opposed by selfish lovers of money who regard not God nor man, but the spirit and ruth of God opens the blind eyes and hearts of men putting them right with God and man. Can we say with the man whose eyes the Lord opened, "one thing I know, whereas once I was blind now I see," as regards our business pursuits as well as our deceitful hearts.

### THE VANCOUVER STRIKE.

President Gompers Says Railway Offer is Fair.

Vancouver, B. C., March 13.—In connection with the C. P. R. proposal to refer matters in dispute with employees to the international unions recognized in the railway service, President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor this evening wired your correspondent from Washington:—"Offer to refer arbitration dispute between railway employees and railway company to the executive officers of railway brotherhoods, all differences existing between the classes of labor they cover, is manifestly fair."

Premier Prior will be here to-morrow, when the U. E. E. will present their troubles to him. Aside from these new suggestions of mediation, the strike interest locally centres in the position of the union teamsters, who last night by 8 to 1 rejected the merchants' ultimatum, which was to support the master draymen in using non-union labor if the unionists still refused to handle merchandise. Their argument was in brief that it is manifestly unfair to tie up shipments started Vancouverward prior to the strike, or goods imported by lines competing with the C. P. R., but entering Vancouver recently over the Canadian Pacific from Seattle. The teamsters' absolute refusal was delivered this morning, when this afternoon the master teamsters themselves broke the freight blockade. The strikers offered no interference. Meanwhile the strikers' positions here are very generally filled, and railway business is not especially embarrassed, although trouble is not unlikely in sending the Empress of India outward on her schedule time.

### WHO FIRED THE SHOT?

Robert Sears of Heathfield Dies of Wound.

Kingston, March 13.—The news was announced yesterday of the death of Robert Sears, who resided at Heathfield, two miles outside the city. Mr. Sears, who was considered a wealthy man, had been an invalid for some years, and slept alone. At an early hour the household was startled by hearing a pistol shot, and rushing to Mr. Sears' room, found him unconscious, with a wound in his right groin. He died shortly afterwards. The deceased was aged 61 years, and is survived by his wife, two daughters and two sons.

### PERSONATOR ARRESTED.

Robert Foster, Convicted at St. Thomas, Found at His Home.

St. Thomas, March 13.—Robert Foster, who was convicted by Judge Bell of personation in the taking of the referendum vote and sentenced to one year in jail, with a \$500 fine, was arrested at his home here yesterday. He was in the United States at the time of his conviction.

### DIED FROM EXPOSURE.

Dr. Frank Turnbull Upset in a Canoe on the Maitland River.

Godsrich, March 13.—A sad fatality occurred here yesterday. Dr. Frank Turnbull of Auburn, the younger brother of Dr. J. L. Turnbull of this town, while attempting to come down the Maitland River in a canoe from Manchester, was upset into the water. He was seen from the bank near the Grand Trunk depot here, and was taken out about a mile lower down the river. Although living when rescued, he succumbed from exposure to the cold. Every effort was made to save his life.

### SHAWINIGAN LANDSLIDE.

Part of the Waterway Carried Away.

Shawinigan Falls, Que., March 13.—At 9.30 yesterday a landslide occurred here near the Northern Aluminum Works building, carrying part of the Shawinigan Water & Power Company's waterway into the Belgo-Canadian Company's mill and late the Little Shawinigan River, compelling the pulp mill to suspend operations for two weeks, until the track is cleared.

### SHOT HIMSELF DEAD.

Fatal Accident to Mr. D. D. McArthur of Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, March 13.—Yesterday Mr. D. D. McArthur of Cumberland street, while cleaning a revolver, accidentally shot himself dead. Mr. McArthur was a brother of J. D. McArthur, lumber merchant, and was employed by him. He leaves a wife and child, and was removed to Winnipeg only a short time ago from Glenarry.

## WIRELESS MESSAGES SENT.

A Successful Trial of the De Forest Telegraph System.

Toronto, March 13.—Wireless telegraph messages were exchanged between Toronto and Hamilton yesterday, through the medium of the de Forest wireless telegraph system. In the loft of the boathouse receiving and transmitting machines had been installed, which were to send and receive electric current, which was caught by the wires from the tall mast erected just outside the boathouse.
