of roundary waters. To be specific this means that - with the treaty effective - the Ogoki and the Long Lake water will be Canadian water for power after diversion.

## RECENT DEVELOPMENTS

The foregoing summary outlines the main features of the situation as it stood in 1934.

## Canada-Ontario

The subsequent developments of the Canada-Ontario situation are very completely summarized in the précis of correspondence with the Ontario Government and the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, prepared by Mr. Loring Christie, Counsellor, Department of External Affairs.

The following text will be confined to the more outstanding of these developments.

Following August 13, 1934, exchanges took place between the Ontario and Dominion authorities in respect to the securing of additional water for power purposes at Niagara and with respect to securing the approval of the United States to the Ogoki and Long Lake diversion projects. In the latter
