U.K. EMIGRATION FIGURES SHOW A MARKED DECREASE

Slackening of Speed in Development of Canada and Reduced Movement to Australia Responsible

(Special Correspondent, W. E. DOWLING.) London, July 22.—The latest return on emigration and immigration from and into the United Kingdom in 1913 just issued by the British Board of Trade, shows a reduction as compared with the years 1910 to 1912.

Canada Maintains Position. CANADIAN PULP MILLS USED 1,109,034 CORDS IN 1913

During Same Period There was Exported Almost As Much Again to United States

The manufacture of pulp in Canada in 1913 showed an increase of over twenty-eight per cent over that of 1912, increases taking place in every province but Nova Scotia.

The increase manufacture of heavy Kraft wrapping papers has caused demand for pulp made by the sulphate process and the manufacture of this particular kind of chemical fibre has increased considerably in the last two years.
