I Congratulate you most cordially, on the termination of a long and severe war, by the figning and ratification of preliminaries of peace between Great-Britain and France and although this Province, by the fostering care of our beloved Sovereign, and the precautionary vigilance of his Majesty's ministers, has been, during the whole contest, protected and fecured, not merely from immediate danger, but from almost every injury attendant on a state of war; yet, in a thinly inhabited country, where the most destrable acquisition is that of industrious farmers to cultivate an extensive waste of wilderness, peace will be at all times among the first of public blessings.

The check which the termination of the war must at first occasion to commercial pursuits, will, I hope, be speedily obviated by new and more extensive sources of trade, as well as by your attention to protect and encourage, as occasion may require, the agriculture, fisheries, and commerce of the Province.
