

COSSACKS OF THE RUSSIAN ARMY CHARGING THE GERMAN DEATH'S HEAD HUSSARS BETWEEN KORSCHEN AND BARTENSTEIN IN EAST PRUSSIA

Mr. R. M. Ames, who was the English manager of a large estate in East Prussia, personally described the incident depicted picture to F. Matania, special artist for this newspaper, the New York Herald and the London Sphere, upon his return to England. "O the evening of August 26," he says, "I saw the flames of burning villages round me, and at Schwansfelds, between and Bartenstein, I saw through my glasses a battle taking place between about ten thousand Germans and fifteen thousand Russians. On the German left were the Death's Head Hussars. I saw the Cossack cavalry charge them full tilt. There was a tremendous impact and hand to hand fighting, and then all of a sudden the whole German line began with one accord to retreat. This quickened and when the hussars disappeared from my sight toward Bartenstein they were in a rout, with Cossacks pursuing and killing them in large numbers."
