"Smiler's" Tribute to His Dead Hero

A correspondent sends the London Express this touching story of a soldier's tribute to an heroic comrade: "Sunday, June 13, my son was visiting friends at the small town of W— He heard from the vicar's wife of the death of a fine soldier (K.A.M.C.) that day.

"The brave man had been to the front, and in times of special danger had kept back his comrades while he, a fine, strong man, had gone forward and carried in the wounded in his arms. He had later paid the penalty—two wounds in his leg. Brought home, he died in his own town of W—.

"Now for the sequel. Later in the day my son travelled to London, and was joined by a Tommy, with whom he got into conversation. "I'm pretty right now—got wounded out yonder," said the Tommy. "Had a pretty bad time, and haven't been out of hospital long. Funny thing happened to me to-day, and I'm fairly upset.

"You see, sir, when I was wounded a big chap came and picked me up in his arms and carried me back. Before he put me down he whispered in my ear, 'Smiler' (they always call me Smiler—I expect it's because I'm always smiling). 'Smiler,' he says, 'When you get back to England go to W— if you can and tell my friend: I'm all right.'

"Well, sir, I've just been, and what do you think? I found he was dead. It fairly knocked me. Couldn't go and tell his friends, could I?

"Tell you what I've done, though. Of course, I haven't much money, so I went and gathered some wild flowers and I wrote a label. Here's a copy of what I put on it:

"From your old pal Smiler."

JURY DECIDES THAW IS SANE

Slayer of Sanford White Wins Important Legal Victory.

New York, July 15.—Harry K. Thaw yesterday was declared sane by a jury which for nearly three weeks listened to testimony given in the Supreme Court here before Mr Justice Peter Hendrick. Forty-eight minutes were consumed and two ballots were taken in the reaching of a verdict.

Mr Justice Hendrick on Friday morning will announce whether the commitment upon which Thaw was incarcerated in the State Hospital for the Criminal Insane at Matteawan shall be vacated, thereby giving to the slayer of Sanford White the liberty for which he has fought in the courts for nine years.

Before receiving the jury Mr Justice Hendrick warned the jury that any demonstration would be met with severe punishment. Then the jury came in and rendered their verdict that Thaw was sane.

Despite Mr Justice Hendrick's warning several persons stood up in front of their seats. The courtroom hummed like a dynamo. Mr Justice Hendrick and a dozen court attendants rapped for order.

Thaw immediately went to where his mother was sitting a few feet away, and, throwing his arms about her neck, kissed her twice.

The verdict recorded, John B. Stanchfield, chief counsel for Thaw, made a motion that the committee signed by Justice Dowling, following a verdict of not guilty on the ground of insanity, which was returned by the jury at Thaw's second trial for the murder of White, be vacated. Justice Hendrick, however, refused the motion, that he had not yet given his own decision, set eleven o'clock to-day as the time when he would receive briefs and hear arguments in his chambers upon the motion to dismiss the commitment. Meanwhile, Thaw remains in the custody of the sheriff.

As soon as the jury was dismissed Thaw crossed to the box and shook hands warmly with each of the men. His mother also shook hands with the jurymen, saying to each, "Thank you so much for all that you have done."

One of the jurors asked her whether she had ever had any doubt of the result of this proceeding. Mrs. Thaw smiled and replied in the negative.

It was with great difficulty that court attendants and deputy sheriffs prevented scores of men and women from dashing up to Thaw in the court room and the ante-room and shaking his hand in congratulation of his legal victory.

Outside the courthouse another great crowd had collected. When Thaw, flanked by deputy sheriffs, appeared in the doorway a great shout went up and those who did not cheer applauded with their hands.

EXPERTS A POOR LOT.

The experts, according to Dr. Flint, and not lay witnesses, were qualified to say whether or not Thaw was sane. In his charge the jury Justice Hendrick brought up this statement of Dr. Flint, and told the jury he did not believe that only the word of alienists was of value when the jury were making up their minds about Thaw's sanity.

The jury went to the judge one better; when they began to deliberate after the preliminary ballot they decided unanimously early in the deliberations to disregard absolutely the testimony of alienists.

The jury went even further, and discussed whether or not it would be advisable to draft a letter to the Legislature asking if something could not be done about limiting the activities of experts in cases such as the one they were deliberating over at the time. There was no doubt, if one were to judge by the tone of the jurors' remarks following the rendering of their decision, that they held the testimony of experts as next door to silly.

A BRITISH PHALANX

(From the New York Post)

With regard to the situation in England there has been an exaggeration, a great deal of exaggeration. From a shortage of ammunition the correspondents, professional and amateur, have gone on to speak of no ammunition at all. They have pictured the British sitting helpless in their trenches under German fire unable to make reply. This is absurd.

What England is actually agitated about is not a shortage of shell for her present battle-line but an adequate supply for the immense new armies she is creating. Where is the British army? The Germans ask now as they did during the first days of the war. Of that army a million is now in France, probably, and other millions are still drilling. If no British advance force has been attempted the reason may not be altogether one of munitions, important though that may be. There are indications that British policy is against any attempt by a portion of her full available strength.

If the Germans are to be pushed out of Belgium, the attempt must be made by vast numbers, and the attack must be sustained. A thoughtful article in The London Nation some weeks ago called for the creation of a "phalanx" a heavy mass of men, a huge human battering ram, such as the Germans drove against the Russians in Galicia. Such a phalanx is unquestionably now in the course of formation in northern France, and it will be made up of men as well as guns.

U.S. MEAT PACKERS ARE KICKING HARD

Washington, July 15.—Difficulties of American meat packers with Great Britain over the detention of their cargoes to neutral countries will be taken up by the state department in a note to the British Government it was said to-day.

The packers, who have appealed to the Washington Government to demand that Great Britain stop interfering with their cargoes consigned to neutral ports and settle for \$14,000,000 worth of their products now held up in prize courts, continued their conferences with state department officials to-day. They charge the British Government with the destruction of commerce in food products between the United States and other countries.

In a statement outlining their case as submitted to the department, the packers assert that the British Government purposely delays settlement of their claims for seized cargoes and that they are not inclined to re-open their conferences with state department officials to-day. They charge the British Government with the destruction of commerce in food products between the United States and other countries.

The American note to Great Britain, which, it was said, would be sent immediately, will deal specifically with the complaint of the packers. The general subject of interference with neutral trade under the British order-in-council will form the subject of another communication to Great Britain.

450,000 SQUARE MILES GERMAN LAND OCCUPIED

London, July 14.—Four hundred and fifty thousand square miles of German colonial possessions have been occupied by the Entente allies during the war. This official estimate was announced yesterday by A. Bonar Law, the British Secretary for the Colonies.
