NO FURTHER TROUBLE WITH HYDRO POWER

Damage at Dundas Not as Much as Appeared at First Steady Service.

Mr. W. R. Catton, the local superintendent of the Hydro Electric System, was in Dundas yesterday and saw the sub-station which was partially burned. Mr. Catton reports that while the wreckage looked very bad, investigation has shown that beyond damage to the building, the Hydro Maintenance Dept. that the switches are in good order, and with a few small repairs will be in use again. The building itself can be quickly put into shape. Power will be sent through the lines right along, said Mr. Catton, to the Courier.

"Temporary conditions," he stated, "will carry the system through indefinitely and will give good service the same as in the past. To The Editor

PASSING EVENTS. To the Editor of The Courier.

Sir—Would you kindly allow me space for a few remarks.

I am sorry to see that although I have talked the question over about getting together to study the 1915 Financial Statement to present one have the courage to give voice to it. Several have asked where the meetings would take place. I suggested the schools, and it being for educational purposes, the Board would not refuse. One prominent member of the Liberal Club put his foot on this prospect at once and said the school could not be given for such purposes. So much for reform on his part. I hope there are not many like him.

Now Sir, although not a resident of the Hill, in the meantime I have still an interest in the same by paying rates for that part of the city. I was pleased to see so many worms turn when the erroneous statement of the officials that the Hill was using as much water as the rest of the city, and the revenue did not cover it. Apart from health, does the revenue of West Brantford cover the expense of the Hill? The financial statement distinctly states the new electric pumps are in efficient. Were they not installed in the face of practical, by unpractical men?

When comes a statement from the Secretary, to boil all water before drinking. Where can we get a more childish order? What is the water coming from, the bubblers, where the children are playing around; are they to boil it? and again, what about the men in the factories, should they carry their supply of boiled water? Now comes Mr. Fair's statement of being away from home when this excessive use of water occurred, and he immediately smelt a rat, being a leak in the pipe. In that case we must have very careful officials to apply to. I find that the mains leading to different parts of the city are 4, 12 and 18 inch mains. But to Terrace Hill we have a 9-inch. Therefore, we have, without taking into account the other pipes take, the 20x2" gives 400 circular inches against 84. It must be some-thing of a leak. Some lively officials. Then again, we have A. G. Montgomery's statement to show it was against Mr. Fair's leak in pipe. Again I say, some officials! Terrace Hill grievance could easily have been settled, if Mr. Webster's advice had been taken, but electricity had to be used, although it was pointed out electric pumps were a failure in other places, and the people failed to meet the failure here just the same.

It is not resolutions of two years standing the people are looking for a report being on the search for river water to be chlorinated it is time that our officials look out for a supply of good water and not deceive the people, and also themselves, by making new galleries when they know they are using river water direct. Again I say, why should a public utility like the water works have a report given out by the Secretary after a meeting being held. Does not that in itself look rather fishy? A great deal can be said on this question, and it is time it was taken up practically and not with closed doors, and we may find there is not such a handsome profit if things were distributed properly. **PETER NOBLE.**

WATER WORKS NOTICE HOURS FOR SPRINKLING LAWS

No person or persons shall be allowed to sprinkle, or use in any manner whatsoever, the water supplied by the Board of Water Commissioners upon Lawns, Gardens, Yards or Grounds of any description, except between the hours of 6 and 8.30 o'clock p.m., on Lawns up to and including 5,000 square feet; on Lawns over that amount from 5 to 8.30 o'clock p.m., and any person wishing to use the water on their Lawns or Grounds in the morning in place of the evening may do so between the hours of 6 and 8 o'clock a.m., by giving notice to that effect in writing to the Secretary. City time to govern in all cases.

It must, however, be clearly understood that the water cannot be used on Lawns or Grounds both morning and evening. **FRED W. FRANK**, Water Commissioners' Office, Brantford, July 8, 1916.

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
