

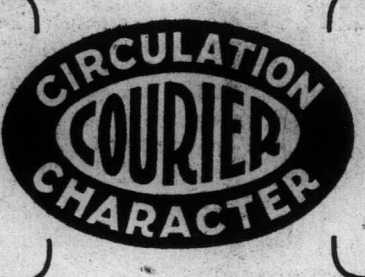

WHY DO PEOPLE ATTEND CHURCH?

Governor of Ohio State Gives Reasons Which Prompt Piety

Frank B. Willis, governor of the State of Ohio, was recently asked why people go to church, and submitted in reply the following list of reasons:

Because in every man's heart there is an everlasting hunger for something better than himself. Church going helps to satisfy that longing and brings nearer the realization of his ideal.

Because attendance at church calls the mind away from the weary trifles and vexations of life and fixes upon those things that abide and fade not away.

Because every man feels within his inmost soul the consciousness that his power butterflies through a day is not the end—that after all the toil and disappointment and accomplishment of life he is not, as the autumn leaf, to fade and flutter to the earth, to pass into nothingness—church going makes more confident that knowledge and assurance that he will survive.

Because there burns in the breast the hope of another and better life beyond—the sacred atmosphere of the sanctuary keeps alive that flame and nurtures that hope.

Because he realizes—perhaps vaguely, but none the less truly—that somehow through the centuries the churchman kept alive the forces that have uplifted mankind and preserved civilization. Attendance at church brings him in closest touch with those forces and makes him feel their influence in his own life.

Because at church he hears in simplest, most eloquent and most majestic words from the Book of Books the sublime truths which the human soul, groping for light and help, ever seeks.

Because at church he can lift his voice in song and keep fresh the memory of inspiring old hymns, strangely and sadly sweet, as they were sung by a mother's voice, perhaps silent now in this world, but singing as we know, our own coming.

Folks go to church because, in a way which they themselves might be unable to define, they there get the inspiration that feeds the flowers of hope and makes possible the fruition of the shortest notice.

Because churchward and the spires pointing skyward symbolize the brotherhood of man and the fatherhood of God—a relationship made understandable and possible by the vicarious life of the lowly Nazarene.

Montreal Gives Well to War Loan

Montreal, March 22.—With the time for applying for war loan stock ending tomorrow in banking and investment circles, where estimates of the last loan proved very conservative, confidence was expressed today that, exclusive of the chartered banks, applications will run well in excess of the \$150,000,000. Counting in the banks, some estimates hold that the total may show the same excess over the amount called for as on the occasion of the last loan, namely \$100,000,000, or a total subscription of \$250,000,000.

Most of the investment houses report that they are well ahead of last year in medium-sized subscriptions, running about \$5,000 to \$10,000, which roll up quickly into big amounts. Local experience is probably being repeated elsewhere.
