Britain Buys Australia's Wheat Output

Washington, Oct. 16.—A despatch from Consul-General Skinner at London to the Department of State announces that the British Government has taken the decisive step of safeguarding the supply of wheat for the British army and for the people at home.

The entire Australian crop has been purchased and a Royal Commission appointed to take charge of buying supplies.

The Australian Government has agreed to furnish Government-owned steamships for transportation, and the commission has decided to control all shipments, providing requisitioned tonnage for the purpose at fixed rates by the Government authorities.

European countries that are not self-sustaining in bread supplies are encountering more than usual difficulty in obtaining enough wheat this fall for the ordinary home consumption.

This is due to the shortage in the Canadian crop and the increasing demand in every direction for the American crop. Despatches to the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce Department state that during July Spain bought 554,000 bushels of wheat from the United States. In that month Spain also bought large quantities of corn from Argentina.

ARMED TURKISH TRANSPORT CAPTURED

Petrograd, Oct. 15.—The Russian submarine Tula on Oct. 12 after an engagement near the Bosphorus, captured the Turkish 6,000 ton armed transport Roditso, says today's Russian official statement. The transport, which was commanded by German officers, was taken to Sebastopol. The statement reads:

"Black Sea.—On Oct. 12 our submarine Tula, under command of Lieut.-Commander Kitzin, captured near the Bosphorus after an hour's unequal artillery engagement the Turkish armed transport Roditso, of 6,000 tons displacement. The transport was under command of German officers, and despite the damage which it sustained during the engagement, was safely escorted to Sebastopol."

HEAVY LOSSES FOR THE ENEMY

Petrograd, Oct. 20.—Announcement of the inauguration of an offensive movement in Eastern Roumania by the army of Field Marshal Von Mackensen is made by the war office. It is said the Germans and Bulgarians have suffered great losses. The battle continues. Official statement follows: "In Dobudja, at seven o'clock o'clock, the enemy opened a fierce fire and assumed the offensive. The enemy attacks were repelled with great losses to him. The battle still continues. In the Black Sea one of our submarines sank two Turkish steamers in the region of the Bosphorus."

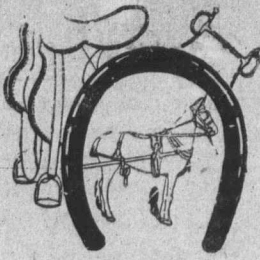
