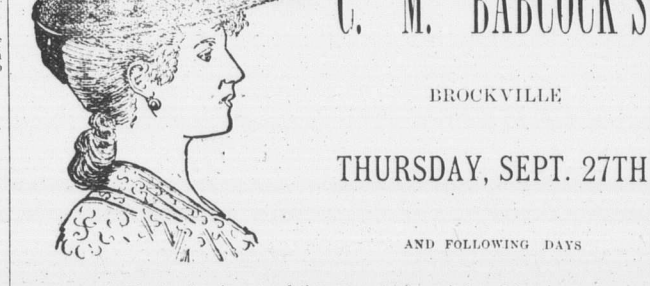

TO PRISON FOR LIFE
HIS SENTENCE COMMUTED

William Walter MacWherrell Will Not Die on the Gallows.
The Commuted Man Receives the News in Brampton Jail and Expresses His Satisfaction at His Good Fortune by Demonstrations of Joy.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—The case of MacWherrell has at last been disposed of by the Cabinet and the result is that the death sentence has been commuted to one of imprisonment for life. The decision was arrived at late in the afternoon.

EXCITEMENT IN CHINA

Disaffection in High Circles
Against the Reigning Dynasty.
THEIR WAR CHEST IS EMPTY
Difficulty in Providing Necessities for the Troops—The Japanese Eager for an Advance on Peking—A Naval Expert Sums Up the Situation.

VIENNA, Sept. 29.—The Politische correspondence says the following information has reached St. Petersburg from China and attracts the serious attention of the government: "The intense excitement in all the provinces of China and the dissatisfaction of the highest officials in the empire have reached a point which indicates a probable movement against the reigning dynasty. The spirit animating the regular army is satisfactory, but the discipline has been much relaxed. The irregular troops upon which the government must now rely are committing great and frequent excesses everywhere. The war chest is as empty as the state exchequer and the government has the greatest difficulty in purchasing the latest necessities for the troops in the field."
