EVIDENCE OF AMITY BETWEEN BRITAIN AND HOLLAND.

Queen of the Netherlands Refers to King Edward In Flattering Terms -Always Among First to Alleviate Suffering-Sends Honor to Gallant Prince Consort-Incident Connected With Wreck of the Berlin.

The toast of the Queen of the Netherlands to King Edward and Queen Alexandra at a recent dinner at The Hague in honor of Prince Alexander of Teck, has been the cause of much favorable comment in the British press. Prince Alexander had been sent to Holland to confer the Grand Cross of the Bath on the Prince Consort in

recognition of his prompt and courageous efforts to save the survivors on the wrecked steamer Berlin.

Speaking in English, Her Majesty said: "I have much pleasure in welcoming Prince Alexander of Teck, to whom it has pleased His Majesty the King of Great Britain and Ireland to entrust the mission of bringing the Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath to the Prince, my Consort.

"I am deeply sensible of the henor so graciously conferred on the Prince by His Majesty, who is always among the first to acknowledge any sttempt to alleviate suffering or to rescue from danger or distress. May this occasion prove a fresh link of sympathy between our two houses, and knit in even closer bonds of friendship our countries, wisch are already united by so many ties in the past and present. I drink to the health of Their Majesties the King and Queen of Great Britain and Ireland and to that of the royal family."

Referring to the incident, The Times says: The ties which unite the British and the Dutch are, indeed, many and strong. We have fought against each other, and we have fought shoulder to shoulder in many a campaign that has made history against common foce of the two countries who were also in bygone times the fees of the liberties of Europe. To no nation do we owe more in the defence and the development of our own domestic freedom than to the Dutch. We knew our Dutch neighbors, and they knew us, since days long before some of the mest powerful of modern continental States were heard of, and the knowledge has taught us respect for the many sterling good qualities which we equally share. A sensible understanding of our real interests is amongst those qualities, and that, we

The annual report of the Foreign
Labor Department, Johannesburg,
1965-6, has been published,

The tale of crime for the year is a long one. The average number of laborers employed during that period was 47,600, and the total number convicted for all offences was 13,532. Of these, 11,754 were convicted of offences against the regulations made under the ordinance, most of them being of a very trivial nature. Cases of desertion, in the accepted sense of the word, amounted to about 1,700. This left a balance of between 1,700 and 1,800 to be accounted for, and official returns about that 243 have been convicted before a judge and jury, 26 of murder, seven of attempted murder, and 210 of housebreaking.

On these figures the report says that the Chinese coolie has undoubtedly been guilty of acts, involving serious loss of life, calculated to cause right-eous indignation and alarm, and these no one seeks to palliate. Still, in the case of white residents, robbery, not murder, has been his motive, and it was only when resistance on the part of the male householder was offered that the latter came to an untimely end, and it should be particularly noted that not a single case of assaults upon women has even been proved.

The great predisposing cause of all Chinese crime in the mines is gambling, and its resultant debt, to a lesser degree supplemented by illicit traffic in opium. The opium habit is fostered and kept alive by certain unprincipled whites, who combine to do almost as great an illicit trade in this commedity as is done in liquor sold to the Kaffirs by the same class. During the quarter ending June last, the average month's mining population was: White, 19,512; yellow, 51,020; black, 111,034; a total of 181,563. The number of coolies repatriated during the year was 3,008. All Born Gamblers.

No More Seasickness.

Sir William H. White, one of the greatest British experts on shipbuilding, said at a meeting of the Institution of Naval Architecture the other day that from personal observation he could certify to the remarkable steadying effect on a vessel of Dr. Schlick's gyroscopic apparatus. In all cases its effect was to cutinguish the rolling motion of the ship almost immediately. The vessel on which he observed the workings of the apparatus was practically deprived by it of all folling motion as she lay broadside to the sea. Sir William expressed the opinion that the apparatus would have great utility attached to Channel and coasting passenger steamers. Gyroscopes could also be designed which would have a steadying effect on the largest ocean steamships. Applied to warships, they undoubtedly would give greater steadiness to gun platforms.

Victoria, B. C., May 1.—During the month of April 18. Chinamen were admitted to this province. These are the first Chinamen to enter the province for two years, and since the head tax was imposed only one had previously come in. The Chinamen bring to the province a revenue of \$9,000.

Rossland, B. C., May 1.—Granby, Dominion and the B. C. Copper Co.'s smelters and mines closed down Monday evening owing to the shortage of fuel. They will remain closed down for a period of two weeks, even if the coal strike is settled. This will throw about 3,000 men out of employment.

Stove Factory Burned.

Lorain, O., May I.—Fire of unknown origin Monday night destroyed the plant of the National Stove Company. The loss is estimated at \$200,000. Four hundred men are made idle by the fire.
