MONEY IN CANARIES

FIRES IN NORTH PUT OUT.

Many Lots Burned Over-Settlers Had Hard Time.

Toronto, June 22.—Word has been received at the Parliament Buildings that a heavy rain is following along the line of the T. & N. O. Railway between New Liskeard and Moose Lake, and all danger of further fires in that district is over for the present.

Deputy Minister of Lands Aubrey White was informed from Webbwood that ten or twelve lots were burned over in the Township of Dunlop, and that Scott and Brown, jobbers, had five horses burned to death in Porter Township.

Mr. Henderson, Government agent at Sudbury, wrote that Moore and Molthrop had \$10,000 worth of supplies destroyed by a fire in the Township of Hurley.

At Chapleau the fire approached so close to the village that it was with the greatest difficulty that the people saved their homes. The whole population had to turn out to fight the flames, and it was only after hours of hard work that the danger was averted.

Chief Fire Powers Medical Activity

Chief Fire Ranger Macdonald wired the department yesterday that the fires in James Township were all out. The damage in this district has been very heavy, but no detailed estimate is yet possible.

The chief ranger reports that five miles of the crown revenue between Silver Lake and Bear Creek were burned over, but most of the timber destroyed was Jack pine and the pine was practically left untouched.

A corps of specials was sent north yesterday by Hon. Frank Cochrane to make an estimate of the damage done. Their report, however, is not expected for a couple of weeks at the earliest.

GOVERNMENT 'PHONES SUIT.

Boards of Trade Approve Action of Alberta Government. Prince Albert, June 22.—Associated boards of trade closed a very important convention here on Thursday, and it was decided to meet in Medicine Hat next very

and it was decided to meet in Medi-cine Hat next year.

The business included a resolution approving the action of the Govern-ment of Alberta in taking steps to provide a Government telephone service and calling upon the Saskatche-wan Government to take a similar action. This was unanimously pass-

ed.

The abolition of local improvement
districts and substitution therefor of
municipalities regularly organized municipalities was also urged. It was decided to ask the Dominion Government to name the point of redemption in each of the new provinces and mominate was also urged. It was decided to ask the Dominion Government to name the point of redemption in each of the new provinces and mominate deputy receiver-general to reside at such points. More roadways through forests, increase in number of fire rangers and other steps to preserve timber were also demanded. Provincial Governments are to be asked to provide 50 per cent, of the cost of hospitals when the balance is provided by municipalities; this is in addition to ordinary Government grants for maintenance.

The Dominion Government will be asked to establish several customs outports in Alberta and Saskatchewan, to facilitate handling customs business. Demand will also be made for more adequate postal service throughout new proficiors of the week

for more adequate postal service throughout new portions of the western provinces.

B.N.A. ACT SECOND READING.

Winston Churchill and Hamar Green-

London, June 22.—The British North America Act, as amended, pass-North America Act, as amended, passed the second reading yesterday.

Winston Churchill and Hamar Greenwood supported it, pointing out that whilst the Government could not interfere between British Columbia and the Dominion, the way was still open for any province to make better terms if possible.

The words "final and unalterable" were omitted, because it was impossible to bind the sovereign Parliament.

Mr. Greenwood indicated with pride as a Canadian the dignified and quiet way the Canadian Prime Ministers, including Mr. McBride, had brought the matter to the Colonial Office. Mr. Greenwood said the bill must pass by July 1. He said the Government in-tended it to pass.

Don't Like Lemieux Act.

Ottawa, June 22.—R. W. Botterell, who is the only grand officer of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers in Canada, returned yesterday from Quebec, where that body has been in session. The meetings were private.

He says that generally the engineers were not satisfied with Mr. Lemieux's Labor Disputes Act. but deaded to leave the matter over for further discussion.

The locomotive engineers will hold their convention in Ottawa next year.

Dies of Lockjaw.

Belleville, June 22.—George Wilson Mitchell, son of James K. Mitchell of this city, died in the hospital early yesterday morning. He was 17 years old. Two weeks ago he stepped on a rusty nail, which penetrated his right foot. Lockjaw developed.

Was Instantly Killed.
Walkerville, June 22.—Harry Eastman, an employe of the Canadian Bridge Co. here, was struck by a falling girder yesterday, and killed almost instantly. He was a young man, and only lately married.

Cattle Man Suicides.
Fredericton, June 22.—John Boyle of J. Boyle & Sons, cattle dealers, shot himself through the heart here yesterday morning, and died almost instantly. He fell off a wagon recently and his mind had been affected.
