Wine Distinction Abroad.

The name of Sullivan Foster Kneeland ranks well up in the list of Canadians who have won distinction in other lands.

Mr. Kneeland was born at Quebec, May 17, 1846. He was educated at McGill University, and removed to New York in 1872.

In the civil war he served as brigadier-general, and in 1876 framed and secured the passage of an act abolishing perpetual imprisonment for debt in New York State.

He was a member of the State Legislature in 1884. As a member of the law firm of Knapp, Le Fevre and Glaze he was secured as counsel to the H. B. Clain Co. and Union Surety & Guarantee Co.

He is vice-president of the department of painting, Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences. His publications include Treatise on Commercial Law, Knapp and on Mechanical Liens, Knapp and on Attachments, and Seven Centuries in the Kneeland Family.

MR. FIELDING'S BILLS

Finance Minister Paid Election Debts Under Protest.

Hon. Speaker Farrell, M. P. P. Got the Money With the Intimation That If Mr. Fielding Was Again a Candidate He Would Not Pay Such Bills—Evidence Was Drawn to Show Agency—The Speaker's Health.

Liverpool, N. S. Aug. 17.—The trial of the election petition against Hon. W. S. Fielding was resumed yesterday. The only important evidence was that of Mr. Fielding himself. He admitted that some time after the election of 1900 Hon. Speaker Farrell, M. P. P., told him there were a number of outstanding election bills, and asked him to pay them. He at first refused to pay, but afterwards, in order to avoid dissatisfaction among his friends reluctantly paid the amount to Farrell. He at the same time intimated that if he was again a candidate he would not pay any more such bills.

This evidence was drawn from Mr. Fielding to show the agency of Mr. Farrell.

The court ruled against the question of the amount paid by Hon. Mr. Fielding to Hon. Speaker Farrell.

Mr. Fielding swore he had in a general way at the last election asked his friends to conform to the law, but could not specify any special occasion when he did so.

The personal charges against him are withdrawn.

Counsel for petitioner closes this morning when the court will adjourn. The testimony of some of the prominent Liberal workers as to their acts during the election showed extraordinary forgetfulness as to the matter of unfavorable comment in the town. Speaker Farrell was obliged by the delicate state of his health to leave here suddenly six weeks ago.

Thief Shoots a Galician.

Brandon, Man., Aug. 17.—A serious and probably fatal shooting affray took place at Kenney early yesterday morning, and a Galician is not expected to live. An unknown man entered the boarding car, the object being robbery, but some noise awoke one of the sleeping Galicians, who got out of his bunk and walked towards the door. The thief, seeing he was discovered, sprang at the Galician and pulling a revolver shot him through the breast and then made his escape in the darkness.

No Doctor Till Near End.

Peterboro, Aug. 17.—As the result of the death of J. Randlett of Boston, Dr. Gray, corner, has issued a warrant for an inquest. He died without a physician being summoned until within a few minutes of his death. Randlett was a Christian Scientist. A post-mortem examination will be held this morning. It is stated Randlett declined to receive medical attention during his illness.

Strikers Back At Work.

Toronto, Aug. 17.—After a short sharp fight of one week, the carpenters' strike was formally declared off in the Labor Temple shortly before noon yesterday at a mass meeting. Some of the men were not satisfied, but the large majority seemed pleased to get back to work upon the terms arranged by the executive of the unions and the new carpenters' Association. Quite a few are inclined to think that it was but a hollow victory for the union men, as many were already getting more than the minimum rate adopted.

Swindlers Arrested.

Hamilton, Aug. 17.—Two young fellows in sporty clothes were arrested here yesterday on the charge of swindling both Hamilton and Toronto business men. They gave the names of Michael Lawry and Frank Kennedy, and their game was to gather money in the name of a football club. In Toronto it was for the Tigers, and in Hamilton for the Wellesleys. They had lists on them of both their Hamilton and Toronto victims, among whom are the mayors of both cities.

Asphyxiated In Trench.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 17.—J. Pina, a married man, employed by the Victoria Gas Co., died in the city yesterday while being conveyed to the hospital yesterday. Pina had been working on repairs to the street gas main, and owing to a leak was overcome. He was resuscitated and returned to work. Coal gas taking some time to mix with the air, his collapse occurred an hour later.

The Bitter Bit.

Port Huron, Mich., Aug. 17.—Mrs. Minah Troyer, who Wednesday swore out a warrant for Fred Thompson, a Canadian, for stealing \$10 and deserting her at the altar steps, is now herself behind the bars. Sheriff Moore recognized her as a woman wanted for illegally living with a man named Vancamp.

Wm. Anderson Is Dead.

Toronto, Aug. 17.—W. N. Anderson, whose death occurred yesterday morning, was assistant treasurer of the province until last year when he retired, after twenty-seven years' service. Prior to this he had been general manager of the Bank of Commerce. He is survived by three children.

Frank Woods Succeeds Peter Small.

Toronto, Aug. 17.—At a cabinet meeting of the Ontario Government yesterday afternoon, Frank W. Woods, an ex-almshouse of this city, was appointed to be bailiff of the tenth Division Court of York vacant by the death of Peter Small.

Bombay Postmen Strike.

Bombay, India, Aug. 17.—About 600 postmen here struck yesterday for increased pay, with the result that the deliveries of mail is almost stopped. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the ringleaders.

Sultan Frees Prisoners.

Constantinople, Aug. 17.—The Sultan has ordered the release of all the prisoners in the empire who have completed two-thirds of their sentence, as a mark of gratification for the recovery of his health.
