THE RANKIN HOUSE GETS A LIQUOR LICENSE THIS YEAR

The West Kent License Commissioners Held a Very Busy Session Yesterday—Many Petitions Received

THE COLORED PEOPLE ARE REFUSED A LICENSE

The above is the list of Licenses granted for the City of Chatham for the year 1906-07 by the West Kent License Commissioners at their meeting yesterday afternoon.

Yesterday afternoon's report concluded with the address delivered before the Commissioners by Rev. Wm. Rutledge, pastor of Park St. Methodist Church. Mr. Rutledge was followed by H. W. Westman, who said he thought that seven hotel licenses would be plenty for Chatham. He was convinced that the Whitney Government was doing all in its power to give the people a better license law, and he thought that the Commissioners would not be living up to the good policy laid down by the Government unless they saw to it that licenses were not granted to unfit hotels. His remarks about the proposed colored hotel were much along the same lines as those of the preceding speakers, and he drew attention to what he termed a lot of letters, whom he said were in the habit of standing in front of Miles' hotel. He said it was likely that the same condition of affairs would exist on the market if a license was granted to the colored hotel.

C. Austin congratulated the new Commissioners on their appointment. He was in accord with the remarks of Messrs. Westman and Rutledge, and he strenuously objected to the establishment of a colored hotel in Chatham.

Mr. French also objected to the colored hotel. The chairman said that the attention of the Inspector had been called to the idlers who had been in the habit of hanging around the Shakespeare House, and since he had spoken to the proprietor a marked improvement had been noted.

The Inspector remarked that it was ridiculous for Mr. Westman to compare the Shakespeare House with the proposed colored hotel. There was no comparison whatever in his opinion.

A few words were next addressed to the Board by Mr. Allister McKay, who said that for his part he would like to see all of the hotels wiped out of existence, but, however, he had to abide by conditions, and the people seemed to be in favor of granting certain licenses. "The Miles Hotel," remarked Mr. McKay, "is nothing but a saloon."

Inspector Massey—Put it fairly. The Miles Hotel cannot be termed a saloon, as it accommodates more

guests on Saturdays than any other hotel in the city.

Mr. McKay—I stand corrected. I have only judged the hotel from the outside—from what I have heard of it. Mr. McKay, continuing, said he believed the pruning knife should be used unsparingly on some of the Chatham hotel licenses.

Someone in the audience remarked that the pruning knife was not much in evidence during the regime of the last Government, of which Mr. McKay was a supporter. Mr. McKay admitted that the Whitney Government was doing all in its power to make the license laws better.

Mr. Rankin—We must call a halt here. Politics must not enter into the discussion.

A. Hall was given permission to speak, but said he only wished to thank the members of the Board for their patience with the preceding speakers.

S. B. Arnold then presented his arguments for the establishment of a colored hotel in Chatham, his principal plea being that at present the colored people had no accommodation in Chatham. Mr. Arnold scored A. D. Westman rather sharply over his remark that the temperance people would bring on a local option campaign if their wishes were not complied with.

The Inspector's report on the proposed colored hotel was not favorable. The building was not a fit one for a hotel to begin with, and as to the applicants, he could not report on their character, as he did not know them personally.

It was at this juncture that the Commissioners took up the consideration of the various applications. The following nine houses on motion of Messrs. Drew and Wilson, were granted licenses: Grand Central, Park House, Glassford House, Rankin House, Garner House, Shakespeare House, Aberdeen House, Merrill House and the Idlewild.

Mr. J. M. Pike, solicitor, applied for a license for the Tecumseh House for Mrs. Fairbanks on condition that Mrs. Fairbanks dispose of the property to Mrs. Barbara Pierce, who would fit up the hotel to comply with regulations. He also requested that the said Mrs. Pierce be granted a permit to conduct the hotel after the transfer had been made. Mr. Pike said that he would undertake to personally guarantee that the transfer would be made as per conditions, and that the bills of creditors against the house should receive proper attention.

Inspector Massey said it was necessary to have a hotel at this location, for the convenience of railway men, and he spoke very favorably of Mrs. Pierce. This license was granted under the said conditions.

The report on the Montana House, which was next read, was favorable to the applicants, but decidedly against the house, which, it was stated, was not by any means up to requirements.

The Klondyke Hotel was reported on as being in very bad shape, and not in a condition to comply with regulations, although the applicant, Mrs. Mount, was reported upon favorably.

The Commissioners then retired to consider in private the licenses for the above two hotels and that for the proposed colored hotel.

When they resumed, the chairman stated that they had decided to grant one month's extension to Hogan and Hoy, of the Montana House, and that they would have to refuse licenses to Mrs. Mount, Jos. Yatoh, and Dunn and Lee, of the colored hotel.

A one month's extension was granted to Mrs. Murphy on her shop license. In Wallaceburg, and city shop licenses were granted to F. A. Robert and Taylor & McKay.

INTERMEDIATE LACROSSE

PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHT

The proper spirit in favor of organizing an intermediate lacrosse team in Chatham is now being evidenced, and influential lovers of sport say they will back up an intermediate team, if the right kind of management take hold.

Intermediate enthusiasts claim that there are over fourteen resident players in the city, who are eligible to play the intermediate game.

John McCoig, who in past years has been the very backbone of lacrosse in this city, in a short interview yesterday, said: "I see no reason why the boys cannot organize and successfully run an intermediate organization in Chatham this year, but of course a great deal depends on how the team is managed. The old executive do not care to take any prominent part in this season's management, but we wish the boys to understand that we are with them, and that we will do all in our power to further the interests of the game. There is lots of material for a good team right here in the city. All the boys need to do, is to get together, organize, and let the people see they mean business, and there will be no question about the support they will receive."
