Legal Decisions.

1. Any person who takes a paper regu-

larly from the Post Office, whether di-

rected to his name or otherwise, or whether

he has subscribed or not—is responsible

for the payment.

2. If a person orders his paper discon-

tinued, he must pay up all arrearages, or

the publisher may continue to send it until

payment is made, and collect the whole

amount, whether the paper is taken from

the office or not.

3. The courts have decided that refus-

ing to take newspapers and periodicals

from the Post Office, or removing and

having them uncollected, is *prima facie*

evidence of intentional fraud.
