Miss Halfkenny's Lecture.

The vestry of the Baptist church was comfortably filled, despite the threatening weather of Thursday night, the 12th inst., to hear Miss L. Halfkenny lecture on the "Free-Women of the South."

The lecture was under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. Mrs (Prof.) Jones, the president, took the chair. Men were conspicuous by their absence, not more than a score being scattered here and there throughout the audience.

The lecture was delivered with pleasing forcefulness. Miss Halfkenny spoke with a power of conviction and an earnestness of feeling that kept her hearers intensely interested from start to finish.

She dwelt upon the great progress made by the freed men of the South during their thirty years of freedom and affirmed that they had certainly demonstrated their ability to succeed. They are taking hold of the common school education and are making wonderful progress in that; and many of them are in the learned professions. They have accumulated some \$300,000,000 of property and own of \$23,000,000 in church property. Such facts quite dispelled the gloomy forebodings which thirty years ago predicted the utter helplessness of the freed negro.

Still the condition of the people calls for grave concern. Here the lecturer introduced the audience to the home life of the people. One-half or two-thirds of them still live in the identical cabin of the old slave days. These are from eight to twelve feet square, eight feet high, have no ceiling and are very plain and poor. The one room accommodates the entire family.

The wages of the people are low. Their illiteracy places the working man at the mercy of unprincipled employers. Dishonest men frequently succeed in making the poor, but ambition, amongst them pays twice over for the land they purchase.

Their religious life is very emotional. The old class of uneducated preacher is being replaced by the seminary graduate. Some of the old timers are very hard to displace of. One church had such trouble to make way with the old pastor and install a seminary graduate that a deputa-tion from it waited on a gentleman for advice. He recommended that they should intimate in a kindly way that it would be well for him to send in his resignation. They all exclaimed "We have sent him his resignation, but he won't accept it now."

The old men have done a good work and most of them are men of faith and good sense.

The morals of the people are not very high. The solution of this evil lies in renovating the home. "A nation can rise no higher than its mothers." Special emphasis must be laid on the elevation of the mothers. With this object in view the Harbors Memorial College, in Richmond, Va., with which the lecturer is connected was commenced. It is sustained by the Baptist Women's Home Mission Society of New England. After sketching the nature of the work of this school Miss Halfkenny closed her most interesting lecture.
