New York market reports state that really fancy apples are meeting a good outlet at very satisfactory prices, but the market is rather slow for medium grades.

Sarcophagus for Sir John Thompson's Grave.

A very handsome stone is to be erected to the memory of the late Sir John Thompson in Holy Cross cemetery from a design made by Phillips Herbert, the well known sculptor.

The firm hopes to have the sarcophagus finished before the end of the year. When dressed it will weigh about seven tons. It will be eight feet long and five feet wide.

There will be a massive cross cut from the marble, extending from one end of the tomb to the other. The structure will be about four feet high including base, and will be one of the finest of its kind in Canada.
