CHANGING THE RULE OF THE ROAD

On the first of January at 6 o'clock in the morning British Columbia will, adopt the drive-to-the-right rule of the road, leaving the Maritime Provinces the only section of Canada following the old world plan of driving to the left. The change is made, as it should be made in New Brunswick, in the interest of public safety. Each succeeding season brings a number of accidents, the direct result of lack of knowledge or failure to remember that the rule of the road here is not the rule in the United States, in Quebec, in Ontario. That we follow a different rule made no difference until the ever-widening use of the automobile brought so many strangers on our roads that the danger menace has become to the limit the danger which might result from local failure to observe the new rule the British Columbia government has adopted a number of practical suggestions put for ward by the Vancouver Automobile Club. The government will provide auto windshield stickers in the form of an arrow, with the words, "Keep to the Right." Signs with the same legend for the back of motors will also be provided and given every traffic officer, with authority to place these upon motors which lack them. In addition, the government is having new, road signs made bearing the legend, "Keep to the Right," which will be put into place on all provincial highways between midnight and six a.m. January 1. Large banners bearing the same caution will be strung across the principal streets of the cities and towns, and street cars will carry both front and rear signs to the same effect. As a further precaution, the Automobile Club will notify all its members of the change. The Maritime Provinces should follow the British Columbia example and inauguerate the keep-to-the-right plan for

POTATO SHIPMENTS

Approximately Three Hundred and Sixty Thousand Barrels Leaving St. John this Season

That approximately three hundred and sixty thousand barrels of pota-toes will be shipped through St. John during the present season was the statement made by Guy G. Porter, of Portor, Hatfield, Gallagher Co., to a representative of The Standard on Saturday. This organization was formed some months ago and its business is that of packing, barrelling and shipping potatoes from the Guy G. Porter Co., Ltd., of Perth, Hatfield & Co., Ltd., of Hartland, and C. El Gallagher Co., of Bath. The proposed shipment of potatoes will comprise the largest exportation in one through St. John of that product in the history of this port, and will afford continuous employment until the middle of June for at least fifty and possibly seventy-five local men.

Previous to last season shipments had been made individually by the three concerns for a period of ten years through the United Fruit Co. from Boston. Chiefly because of the shorter rail haul, the reduction of the risk caused by frost during the cold weather, the proximity to home of this Port and the increased railway rate due to the necessity of payment in American money of sixty per cent of the charges, all exportation of pota-toes to Cuba are now going through St. John.

Forty-five thousand barrels have already been forwarded from this port to Havana, and a further cargo of 13,000 barrels is now being loaded on the S. S. Uffe at shed No. 5. Since the middle of September last six steamers have carried cargoes of potatoes to Cuba, and it is estimated that the total number of boats chartered by the Porter, Hatfield, Galla

gher Co., during the season will range from twenty-five to thirty. The expectations are that about 12, 000 barrels will leave this port every ten days. Shipments are also being made from Halifax to San Diego de Cuba, Bermuda, Trinidad and Demerara but this exportation is compara tively small as compared with the shipments through St. John to Cuba, The potato sheds on the West Side have ben leased from the city, and over \$15,000 is being expended by this company for the purpose of creating frost-proof buildings in which to house this product while awaiting exportation. A very modern heating system, new flooring, trestle and other repairs have been installed so as to make the buildings tenable for such purpose during the cold weather: and on Saturday the steam was turned on for the first time and found entirely satisfactory. , Any surplus remaining after the S. S. Uffe has cleared will be transferred from shed No. 5 to the

future shipments will be made. It is felt that more than double the quantity shipped last season will be exported during the present one. Last year shipments to Cuba did not start until the middle of February from this port, while six boats have already left St. John since the opening of the present one in September last.

Warehouses are erected in numer ous parts of the countles of Madawaska, Carleton and York; and. roughly speaking, about one-third of the potato yield in this Province is forwarded to Cuba and the British West Indies, Canada and the United States. The prices obtained on the Cuban market vary considerably, and sometimes as high as \$28 per barrel is received. On the other hand there are times during a recession with a suctuation on the downward trend when potatoes are sold as low as freight.
