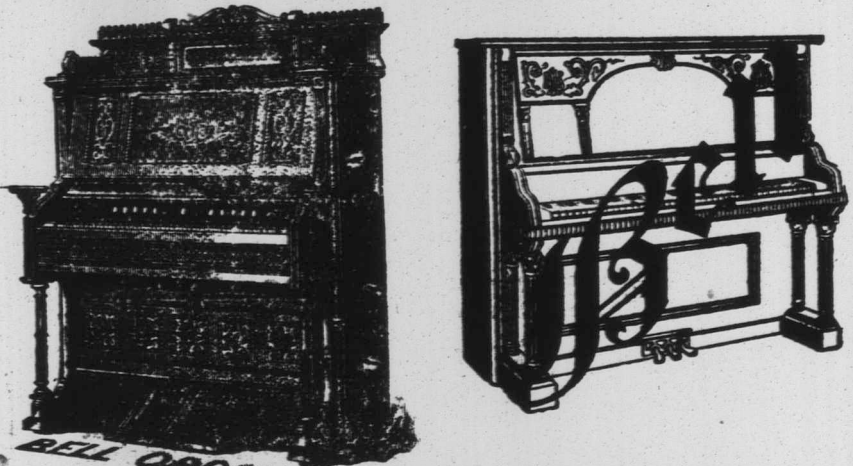

BATHURST HAD TWO SLIGHT FIRES FRIDAY

Citizens Alarmed but no Damage Done—Social and Personal

BATHURST, Friday.—Miss Laura Power and Kathleen Sutton returned yesterday afternoon from Chatham, where they have been attending the convent.

Two alarms have been sent in for fire during the past twenty-four hours. Yesterday afternoon the house on St. George St., owned by Peter E. Hatten and occupied by W. P. Craig was discovered on fire. On account of the high wind much anxiety was felt by property holders. It proved nothing serious and was speedily quenched out with water from a nearby well. A spark lodging on the roof is supposed to be the cause.

About two o'clock this afternoon an alarm was sent in when the I. C. R. freight shed was discovered on fire. The department responded immediately but before they reached the scene the blaze had been put out by an engine which happened to be in the yard at the time.

PETTY CHEATING WITH USED STAMPS

NEW YORK, Thursday.—You would be surprised, said a post office clerk, at the efforts people make to avoid the payment of postage. And quite often it is not the work of children either. The most common trick is to take the stamp that has been cancelled by hand and the inspection just touches the edge of the stamp. After pricking the marked edge with a pin or cutting it with a pair of shears to resemble the punctured edge of the stamp or tearing away that part, the stamp is put on an envelope for another voyage. All these are placed in the hands of postal inspectors for investigation.

Others try to give the impression that a stamp had been put on an envelope and became loose and lost in transit by sticking a stamp on the envelope and then putting it with part of the envelope sticking to it off again. These as well as underpaid letters unless they have a foreign destination, where postage is not collected, are marked "Returned for Postage," and sent back to the sender. Second class matter, as rolls of newspapers, is often sealed against inspection by placing the stamps over the cover. Whether foreign or not it is returned for postage. When it again shows up, the mistake rectified, upon inspection it is usually found to contain written letters, photographs (unmounted) jewelry, merchandise of all kinds, making the package underpaid, hence it is returned.

But the limit of foolishness comes when a person tries to effect the indelible link from the stamp and with half the features of the stamp missing or rubbed away and some of the ink still remaining affixes it to an envelope, with the address of the sender upon the back to facilitate investigation.

This, though is stretching it a little too much. A postcard that had been put through the cancelling machine and delivered to the addressee had the cancelling impression and address scratched off with the aid of a sharp knife and a new address substituted and a written message pasted on the reverse side.

DR. KOCH FLEES FROM CHICAGO

Scientist Declares he Was Driven from City by Bacteriologists and Friends

CHICAGO, Friday.—I am literally driven from Chicago where I came on Monday for a week's rest by over-solicitous friends and citizens and newspaper men, and I am obliged to leave at once," said Dr. Robt. Koch, the German scientist, last night. He packed his five large trunks and had them shipped to St. Louis by express labelled, "Hold until called for within two or three weeks"—paid his bill, bundled his wife and his brother from St. Louis into a carriage and was driven to the Union station, where he boarded a train for Milwaukee.

The interruption which so disturbed the scientist reached its climax yesterday when a party of local citizens and scientists stormed his apartments with pressing invitations for banquets and social gatherings.

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IMPROVEMENT IN LUMBER MARKET IN GREAT BRITAIN

Things not so Lifeless but Improvement is Very Slight

LIVERPOOL, Saturday.—There is a slight tendency towards improvement in the lumber trade. Things are not quite so lifeless as they have been for some months past, but the improvement is only of the very slightest. Some Manchester firms seem not even to recognize that there has been any improvement. Other reports state that actual business is increasing and that enquiries show a great improvement on the sluggish state of things which have prevailed of late. Most of the stocks sold have been of the commoner sorts, and in many instances further concession in prices have been made. Just a little more life is discernible in spruce. A cargo or two is offering, shippers anticipating about 40 c. l. f. for the usual 50-55 per cent. of narrow. The light must start rolling early. Stocks are being depleted and even on a hand to mouth policy must be replaced. The position is too uncertain to say much about it. Quebec spruce is beginning to move. Some fair lines have been placed at prices similar to last year's opening values.

London sales have been very small, but this need not be looked upon as an altogether bad sign. There are many firms in England that have not bought a stick of wood this season. Apparently they are playing a waiting game and it would not be surprising if it should result in more harm to them than good. There is very good reason to expect a more cheerful tone a little later on, both in regard to the prices and demand.

JOKE ON ROYALTY.

Canadian Farmer Didn't Know the Prince.

The Prince, then Duke of York, stole away for a quiet spin one morning, and in his ramblings met a farmer, headed marketwards, his wagon temporarily stalled by the loss of a nail belonging to the wretchedest bolt. His Highness, with his usual democratic kindness, assisted the man to find his lost nail and continued again.

In passing the farmer expressed his rough thanks and asked if he might know the name of the "person" to whom he was indebted. The royal cyclist replied modestly, "I am the Duke of York, and may I ask what I have the pleasure of addressing?"

A broad amused smile beamed from the farmer's face. He puffed out his chest and said, "Me! Me! Why, I'm your uncle, the 'Czar of Russia'!"

ANOTHER REPORT.

As a result of striking his pick in a piece of ground where a gang of men were at work on the construction of the new Atlantic, Quebec and Western railway at a place called Point Macre, Quebec, an explosion occurred sending six men into eternity without the slightest warning. The report is sent by Dan S. McDonald, better known as Dynamite Dan of St. John, Victoria County, C. B. It happened a week ago yesterday about an hour after the men had begun to work, and according to Dynamite Dan was directly due to carelessness on the part of the foreman, who was killed instantly with five others of his gang.

It was a miss shot," writes the Cape Breton dynamite expert, "and when the working gang came out to work in the morning, one of the fellows for a Sunny Italy struck his pick in this spot where the miss-shot was. Badly there was a terrific explosion, six men were killed outright. Parts of some of the bodies were found on the tops of small trees close where the explosion happened, and in order to remove the gruesome remnants, it was necessary to cut down the trees. There were three others badly injured, but they will pull through all right. Fortunately I was uninjured, although only a short distance away when the explosion occurred."

Mr. McDonald has charge of a section of the new road, besides being superintendent of dynamiting.
