Strike on the Irish Railways.

DUBLIN, To-Day.

The Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants have called a general strike on Irish railways. Far from the companies showing any signs of yielding, they began yesterday with the lock-out of large bodies of men employed in the locomotive and other works, and sent out an order for the strikers to return their uniforms. The Irish export trade, on which the bulk of the people are dependent for livelihood, has practically ceased. The Board of Trade is still endeavouring to effect a settlement.
