Our Minority Government.

Not only has Sir Edward Morris lost the confidence of the majority of the electorate, but two of his Ministers have lost their seats. We have thus the spectacle of a Government in this country kept in office, although supported only by a definite and clear minority of voters, and two Ministers kept in office who have sustained one of the most decisive defeats ever known in the political history of New-

foundland. In 1909 the Hon. S. D. Blandford as Minister of Agriculture and Mines was sustained in the District of Bonavista by a vote of 3,158, and Minister D. Morison by a vote of 3,076, their leading opponent receiving only 652 2506, and Mr. Morison's 2424 over the vote of that opponent. Four and a half years passed, the Fisher-

Much evidence has lately been adluced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this, mongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson


