## Prince Welcomed Home By Brothers.

Formal Reception Set for To-day  
—New Brunswick Government  
Breaks Even—Derry Prisoners  
Made a Night of it—Imperial  
Navy Will Sink Soviet Submar-  
ines—MacSweeney Emaciated  
But Bright.

### PRINCE ARRIVES HOME.

LONDON, Oct. 10.  
The cruiser Renown with the Prince of Wales on board arrived to-day at Spithead, on the southern coast of England, and anchored for the night. The formal landing of the Prince and the popular reception planned for him in London will take place to-morrow. The Duke of York and Prince Henry, brothers of the Prince of Wales, boarded the Renown to-night to welcome the Prince home. They will remain on board the cruiser to-night.

### FOSTER WILL CARRY ON.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Oct. 10.  
With some doubt still existing regarding at least one seat the best figures available for the Provincial general elections held on Saturday give the government twenty-four of the forty-eight seats, the Opposition thirteen, United Farmers nine and Labor two. The Government claims one additional seat from the Opposition in King's County. Even with this extra seat the Government will find it necessary to depend on support of some farmer or labor members in order to carry on, but in his speech on Saturday night after the results had been made known Premier Foster announced that the assurances of support he had made him perfectly confident that he would be able to carry on. Two of his Ministers, Hon. Robert Murray, Northumberland, Provincial Secretary, and Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Victoria, Minister of Agriculture, were defeated. The success of Premier Foster and his three colleagues in St. John City, where formerly he had held

only one seat, was one of the interesting features of the contest.

### CLEVELAND WON LAST

#### TWO GAMES.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 10.  
In a game filled with sensational situations beyond the wildest dreams of fiction the Cleveland Americans defeated Brooklyn Nationals eight to one in the fifth contest of the world series here this afternoon. In unassisted triple play by William Wambegans, native born son of Cleveland, and home runs by Elmer Smith and Jim Bagby were individual features that will linger in memory. Saturday's game Cleveland won five to one.

### PRISONERS MADE A DIN.

BELFAST, Oct. 10.  
People residing in the vicinity of the prison at Londonderry passed a sleepless night owing to the din made by Sinn Féin prisoners who wrecked cells, smashed windows and shouted Republican songs. Eventually troops were summoned and surrounded the prison. They first fired in the air and that suppressed the disorders.

### BRITISH WARSHIPS ORDERED TO ATTACK SOVIET-SUBMARINE.

LONDON, Oct. 10.  
Any Russian submarines encountered on the high seas will be attacked on sight by British naval forces, according to the note sent by Earl Curzon, British Foreign Secretary, to M. Tchitcherin, Russian Bolshevik Foreign Minister, on October 2nd, which is published along with the other correspondence recently exchanged be-

tween Great Britain and Soviet-Russia. Earl Curzon points out that he previously sent a communication regarding the submarine launched in the Black Sea, in which he said that in view of repeated declarations of leading members of the Soviet Government that Government considered itself in a state of war with Great Britain, and in view of the possibility in these circumstances of waiting to ascertain whether the intentions of the submarines controlled by the Soviet Government were hostile or not, there was no alternative but to issue orders to British ships to attack the submarine should it be encountered on the High Sea.

### MACSWEENEY BULLETIN.

LONDON, Oct. 10.  
The Irish Self-Determination League issued a long bulletin to-day to the effect that Lord Mayor MacSweeney's condition was not greatly changed. His mind is still bright, says the statement, and vigorous, but he is very much emaciated.

### Want 500 Men for Lumber Industry.

Collishaw-Tulk Co. Ltd., Have Acquired Large Timber Areas.

(Trade Review.)  
As will be seen by advertisement in the papers, Mr. E. Collishaw is looking for 500 men to go to work at the lumber industry at St. George's. The new company lately organized, will be known as "The Collishaw-Tulk Co. Ltd."

The mill at Martin's during the past two years, was operated by Mr. B. Tulk, who is an experienced man, and who was general woods manager for the A.N.D. Co. with 3,000 men under his supervision. His four sons who were all in the war and returned safely, have now all managing jobs in the enterprise under their father, and have all had experience in lumbering at Grand Falls.

Mr. Collishaw bought out all the previous grant holders on the river, and his property is now 250 miles in area and extends 15 miles up on each side of the river. They have contracted with the A.N.D. Co. for the delivery of all the pulp wood per year that the R. N. Co.'s available freight cars can carry to Grand Falls.

There are now 100 men employed cutting pulp wood, and it is expected that the additional 400 will be secured this month. There are two saw mills already on the shore, one at Nardin's, the other at Barachois, but it is the intention to erect a third at once which will turn out 100,000 feet in 24 hours.

It will be an up-to-date mill in every particular, and will turn out veneering for export. Mr. Collishaw lately visited Campbellton, N.B., and personally selected the machinery for this mill, which will be equipped with modern gang splitters. The company will also turn out matched pine and clapboard so that it will be unnecessary to so largely import these qualities as has been the case in recent years.

The idea that the price of lumber has slumped, Mr. Collishaw says, is misleading, when you apply it to all kinds of lumber. It comes about in this way.

There were about 250 small kerosene mills sawing the past year induced by report of high prices. What they mostly sawed was small scantling 2 x 4, 3 x 4 and coopers' stock. This flooded the market, but they turned out no matched lumber nor clapboard, so that only the prices of the small mill stock has declined. As wages to loggers this winter will be higher than last year, prices of lumber turned out by the big mills cannot decline. The smaller stuff referred to will remain cheap for a time as the town is now stocked with about ten million feet, chiefly small scantling. Only mills that have planers can turn out planed board and these are the few large ones.

The Collishaw-Tulk Co. Ltd., are preparing for a big cut and are building 25 camps up the St. George's River. They will give issuing of the smaller supplies for loggers to the small stores already in the vicinity and will themselves run the big store for heavy supplies, like pork, beef, flour, etc.

They will pay the current wages and give a bonus to the men who will stick to the job all the winter till the "drive" begins. Sidings are now being laid down at Nardin's to take the logs to the main line. The available cut includes pine, spruce, fir, birch and witchazel.

### Gorton Pew Co. Buys Green Fish.

Fishermen Sell Catch From the Knife at \$2.25 per 100 Pounds.

The Gorton Pew Co., are buying fish from the knife on the Southern Shore at \$2.25 per 100 pounds. There is no more trouble with the fish once it is split, and the men engaged in this business are making good pay, especially at Renews and Ferryland where they have kept steadily at the fishery with hook and line since the traps were taken in.

Seeing that this mode of selling fish gets clear of the Regulations, it is likely that if the Rules remain in force there will be a great many more fishermen engaged in this mode of disposing of their fish next season, especially on the Southern Shore and the South Coast.

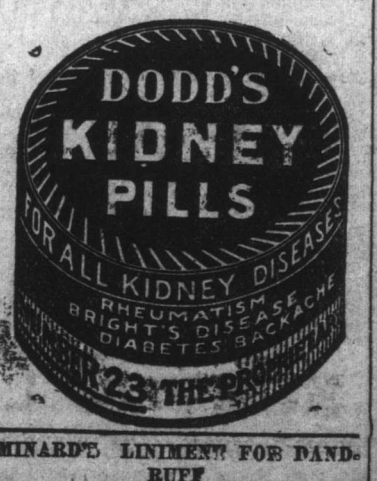
The same applies to all green fish for which there is always a good market in the New England States. Of late years the tendency has been in this direction owing to the fact that as time goes on it is more and more difficult to get fish curers, women or men, and is quite the reverse of the old times in this respect, when every crew had a staff of fish curers on the room, whose special work it was to cure the catch in all its stages after being thrown up out of the boats. They were mostly women and girls of the planters and fishermen's families.

To-day people like this cannot be found and it is a rare thing to find women and girls to work at curing codfish.—Trade Review.

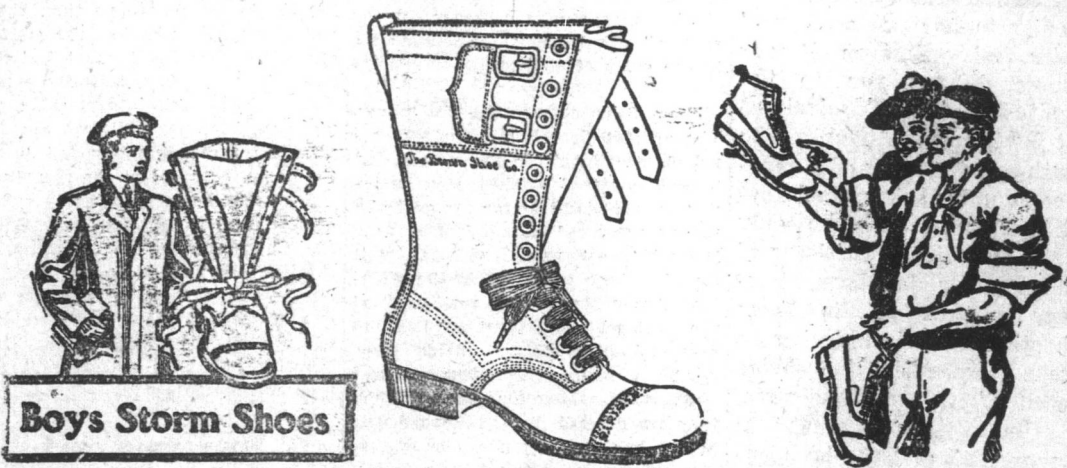
