JUST A COLUMN OF LOCALS TO HOLD DOWN OUR CLAIM TILL THE ENQUIRY IS OVER.

The concert-entertainments at Lockston and Trinity East, that I called attention to a fortnight ago, are now things of the past, but not to be forgotten. The one at Lockston was well patronized by people from the immediate settlement, and from Trinity East and Trinity. The School House was filled to capacity with about eighty people. The programme was a full one and included the usual sequence of recitations, dialogues, and songs, each of which was creditably rendered. The children gave evidence of their being endowed with marvellous powers of memory, whilst the grown-ups did their parts well. Viewing it all with a knowledge of their limitations in opportunities for training, etc. it was highly creditable to them, and when they announce their next presentation in their own settlement, we shall be there again. Mr. William Peddle was the Manager, and he has reasons to be proud of his efforts, which had much to do with the all round success of the entertainment.

The entertainment given by the young people of Trinity East and Port Rexton, was held in the Parish Hall, Trinity East, on Wednesday evening, February 20th, in aid of the outfitting of the Church Lads Brigade in those places. The night was ideal for travelling, and about forty people from Trinity crossed the harbour-ice to swell the patronage and to be entertained. The three hours' programme was splendidly rendered and thoroughly enjoyed by the three hundred people in the auditorium, from Port Rexton, Trinity East and Trinity. The programme was a varied, but a well balanced one; and there was not a faulty rendering of a part in it. Rev. F. Law, who had given much time and talent in training the young people, has every cause to be thankful for the abundant results of his work, by the fine rendering of the parts assigned by him to them. The girls (in song and play and dialogues) were just splendid; and amongst them are those who are possessed of the talent of being able to translate difficult parts by natural actions, such as would enable them to do themselves and their parts credit in more pretentious surroundings. Dr. Fitzgerald, the officer in command; Mr. Whitfield, Minister, and other officers of the Church Lads Brigade were in official evidence, and the two songs rendered by each (the Dr. and Mr. Bannister) added materially to the good things that were thoroughly enjoyed. The programme was repeated the next night, and altogether about \$50 was secured towards the cost of uniforms for the local Church Lads Brigade, of whom the people of Port Rexton and Trinity East have always had much cause to be proud. Do it again.

Another entertainment under the auspices of the "Garland Club," Trinity East, will be given at Trinity East this week. And still another will be given in the Parish Hall, Trinity, by volunteer artists of the town, in the interests of Maps, etc., for the day school. Neither of these entertainments had been given when I posted this manuscript; details of them will be given next week.

THOMAS GAWLER—1825-1874.
Thomas Gawler was born in the parish of All Saints, Dorchester, England, in the year 1825, and came to Trinity about the year 1856. In the year 1851 he was married to Patience Butler, widow of Charles Butler of Ireland's Eye. There is no record in my possession from which I can find just what position he filled during the next twenty-five years. The facts,

however, that his first wife was from Bonaventure, and that in 1856 I find his name as School Teacher and Lay Reader at British Harbour, suggest that he lived at British Harbour during those years. In 1869 he was married again to Elizabeth Carberry of British Harbour, and he died there in 1874, aged 49 years. There was another Thomas Gawler who came to Trinity about the same time as shoemaker at Garland's. He was a Wesleyan Local Preacher, and his wife taught school in the old Fancy House, that stood on the left hand corner of the road now leading from the main road up to the Orange Hall. To ensure uprightness of the body, as a child sat during school hours, Mrs. Gawler used to put a plate on the child's head; and the knowledge that it would fall if an upright position were not preserved, produced the desired effect. Our Mrs. Pittman, the children of the late Magistrate, B. Sweetland, and others attended the school. Mr. and Mrs. Gawler left Trinity for Canada about 1880, and some of their household appointments, that were sold before they left are still preserved in Trinity, one of which was an old-fashioned sugar-barrel, now in possession of Mr. William White, H.M.C.

Monorail Line Replaces Burro in Mohave Desert.

San Bernardino, Cal., Feb. 21. (A.P.)—The passing of the burro, which has been the best means of transportation on the Mohave desert, is predicted by miners since the advent of a mono-rail line, recently laid across the sands in San Bernardino county.

The line, one of the few operated in this country, extends from Trona to a bed of salt deposits on the southern edge of Death Valley, a distance of 28 miles. Like the humble burro, the monorail car carries its load swung on either side. It is drawn by a gasoline-propelled engine.

Miners are interested in the operation of this road, believing it the forerunner of scientific transportation in desert mining regions.

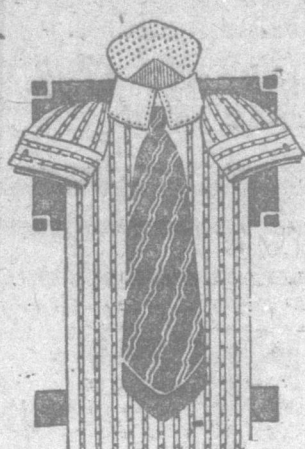
