To New Zealand
in a Small Boat

FATHER AND DAUGHTER SET
SAIL

Crowds of men, women, and chil-
dren gathered on the quayside at
Sutton Pool, Plymouth, to take a
last glimpse of a little white boat
with ruddy sails as she threaded her
way out into Plymouth Sound on a
daring voyage.

It was full of the spirit of the sea-
sons of Devon that the skipper of the
good boat Merganser (she is too
small to term a ship, being but 35 ft.
in length), William Unitt, an ex-Navy
man, and his "crew" consisting of
his only daughter, Dora (15), weigh-

ed anchor, and set sail for the Anti-
podas, a voyage of 13,000 miles.

In an interview the Merganser's
master said: "We expect, if all goes
well, and with favourable weather,
to reach our destination, Dunky Sound,
New Zealand—where I intend to set-
tle with my wife and family—in
about four months.

"The Merganser is as good a yawl-
rigged nine-tonner, as you will find
anywhere. I have done every bit of
the fitting out myself, even to in-
stalling the paraffin 14-h.p. engine.
We shall rely on our sails as far as
possible, but in emergencies the en-
gine will give us a useful speed of
about ten knots an hour.

"My wife and son are booking
passages to New Zealand by liner,
but Dora, my daughter, according to
that way. She is a fine sailor and
splendid swimmer, and has proved
on previous cruises that she can
handle the Merganser as well as I
can.

"Our craft is well found in every
respect—we have the luxury of wire
mattresses in the bunks of our 22-ft.
cabin, which is lighted by electricity
and a powerful wireless equipment
will enable us to receive and to send

out signals.

"I have chosen the Cape route to
New Zealand and this time of the
year because the conditions are most
favorable.

"We shall touch, among other
places, on our way to Cape Town,
Ascension Island and St. Helena, and

Ocean, where we shall have to ne-
gotiate the 'Roaring Forties' to the
Australian coast."
