

Important from Abyssinia. New York, April 2— The Herald's Lake Ashangi, Abyssinia, special of March 16th, says the advance of the British army under Gen. Napier ar-vive at this point on the march to-wards Magdala to-day. An Abyssinian chief, who is encamped near the troops refuses to give food to the army on any terms. This chief dares Gen.
