

F.A.P.
We find the following in the London Advertiser: We have received, from a private source, the public Accounts of Ontario for the nine months ending 30th Sept. Why the Government have not forwarded these accounts to the Press, like other public documents, we have yet to learn. Perhaps, like some of the items therein contained, they are not meant for the profane vulgar. At the present time we shall only refer to the amount paid to various newspapers. On page 15 we observe, under the head of Legislation, that Robertson & Cook, of the Toronto Telegraph, received \$1957.95 for sessional printing paper, and \$880.35 for printing blank forms. Beatty, of the Leader, for "Parliamentary printing," \$1718.75. On page 33, under head of advertising connected with the Executive Council Office, the Hamilton Spectator gets \$100; Canadian Freeman, \$80; Toronto Telegraph, \$80; Brantford Courier, \$41.80; London Free Press, for apparently the same service, \$104. It may appear singular that the accounts of the weekly Freeman and the daily Telegraph are equal. Friend Lemmon, of Brantford, who only asked for \$41 odd, will probably be emboldened to make smarter charges on another occasion. The Spectator's \$100 bill shows that our ambitious conferees are not likely to suffer from excess of modesty. The Free Press bill of \$104 is also well earned. Does not our contemporary whitewash the Ontario Government whenever they want it, which is pretty often? Our friend the Prototype, is nowhere. Not even a \$5 advertisement! According to this the Free Press must be the favoured and confidential organ of the hon. member for London. And this, after years of service and devotion on the part of the Prototype! If we were that paper, we would go into Opposition right off—we really would. On other pages, in addition to the papers mentioned as recipients of the Government pay, we find the Union Advocate (a new Brunswick paper), Kingston Whig, Windsor Record, Ottawa Times and Ottawa Citizen, Peterborough Review, Victoria Warrier, Listowel Banner, Stratford Colonist, and United Service Gazette, a sort of military paper published at Ottawa. Some of these are well-known; others seldom heard of, though we presume they have each a local habitation and a name somewhere.
