Twenty thousand Knights of Labor employed in the Charleroi, Belgium, coal basin have decided to strike on May Day.

The London Engineer shows that over 70 per cent. of the freight employes in England are on duty over twelve hours at a time. On several lines all engineers and fremen are on duty over twelve hours at a time. It is also stated that a large percentage of men who are on duty over twelve hours return to their posts after less than eight hours of rest. In many instances men are required to be on duty eighteen hours at a time, and legislation has been enacted against this practice.
