CYCLONE IN BRANTFORD.

BRANTFORD, Aug. 10. — About 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon the city was enveloped in a severe cyclone. Three black clouds drove up from the west and darkened down over the city. With them came a strong wind, which blew for at least half-an-hour with the greatest fury. Away north the storm was accompanied by heavy rain and a severe electrical disturbance. Within the city and the immediate outskirts considerable damage was done to property, and to trees, fences and wires.
