WATER THE STREETS.

City merchants complain bitterly to-day about the condition of the business streets They assert that though they are charged heavy taxes on their stocks, and have to pay for street watering in addition, the water has been cut off and the water commissioners delay take ing the reasonable precaution necessary to insure a sufficient supply to tide over the dry spell. One drygoods merchant called the writer's attention to the state of Dundas street, between Richmond and the Market lane. It has been made into a dusty gravel road through the determina-tion of the authorities to prevent the street railway company from putting down their switch and relaying the block pavement, for which also the merchants are taxed. that by the failure of the commissioners to keep their contract to water the streets, the drygoods men alone lose hundreds of dollars daily by the destruction of their property through the clouds of dust. Surely the commissioners ought to have at once closed with Leonard & Son for the use of their engine to augment the present pumping apparatus, instead of delaying so necessary a precaution. The drygoods men assert that they have already lost more through the lack of street watering than would pay for the auxiliary engine till
