Tambling Takes It

Final Race for the Meteor Club's Gold Medal.

London and Delaware Medical and Legal Lights at Bat.

The Forest City Express Wins Easily—A Good Bicycle Road Race at Woodstock—Various Sporting Events.

THE WHEEL.

C. H. TAMBLING GOT THE MEDAL.

Charles Tambling is the champion of the Meteor Club. He proved it last night in Queen's Park to a gathering that numbered nearly 1,000. The Meteor Club held their third and final race for the club medal. It was originally intended to run on the St. Johns road, but the action of the Proct Line Road Company in forbidding any more road racing on that thoroughfare interfered with the arrangements. And to run it on the Queen's Park was the only alternative. Wm. Sherbrooke and C. Tambling were in it. They both had their eyes on that gold medal. Both were scratch men and with the word started off together. Tambling forged to the front, with his wiry little opponent close behind. The pace was hardly fast enough to suit Sherbrooke, and he took the lead at the quarter and made his then pursuer get down to business. Tambling stuck close to Sherbrooke, and for fifteen laps out of the twenty kept within close range. One by one the other competitors were passed at the same lively clip. On the twentieth round Sherbrooke settled down and increased his speed. So did Tambling. On the turn into the stretch the latter started to edge up. Little by little he pulled forward, until within 200 yards of the finish Tambling, by a desperate effort, shoved the nose of his wheel about four feet ahead and kept it there to the end. The applause that greeted the riders was tremendous, everybody jumping to their feet and everybody making a noise. Asplaud made a good race at times, although he did not have the stamina to hold out. For the last few laps he kept pace with the two leaders, remaining in very close proximity to Tambling's coat-tails. The company was too fast, however, and Asplaud had to fall back. Toward the end, again, he repeated the feat. Bartie Firth put up a good race and so did Allison. Henry Gorman dropped out early. The handicaps, order of finish at the time of the race and the points made by each rider in the three races are:

Tambling, therefore, got the time medal; W. Allison, first place prize, with the second place prize to be competed for by Sherbrooke, Firth and Asplaud. Mr. Thomas Gillen acted as starter and timer; Messrs. A. Talbot and A. Gorman as judges, and Messrs. Percy Carroll, Richard Evans and Bert Glover as scorers. The presentation of the medal took place immediately after the race, Mayor Essery performing the ceremony. The handsome gold medal was then pinned on Tambling's breast and three cheques given for the champion, Allison and the winner of the second place medal will receive their rewards when the latter is decided.

ROAD RACE AT WOODSTOCK. WOODSTOCK, Aug. 17.—The handicap road race was held last evening by the Y. M. C. A. wheelmen on the Beachville course, about eight miles with turn. THE LONDON CLUB. The London Bicycle Club can now proudly boast of having the largest membership of any club in Canada, barring Toronto. The monthly meeting was held last night, and 17 new members were added to the roll, making it 109.

THREE WORLD'S RECORDS GO. DENVER, Col., Aug. 17.—Three more world's records were consigned to oblivion at the national race meet of the L. A. W. here today. Eddie Ball, of Buffalo, in the half mile class B handicap rode the prettiest race of his life from the scratch line and came in fourth in a field of twelve, passing eight men in the last 100 yards and placing the world's half mile competition record at just one minute.

C. H. Wills, of San Francisco, who won the event, rode from the 40 yards mark in 59 4-5 seconds.

Then eighteen-year-old Otto Ziegler captured the two-mile national championship in 4:21 3-5, nearly 7 seconds better than the best previous time for the distance.

Harry Maddox, the Jersey boy, went for the unpaired mile record of 2:11 1-5 (held by Sanger), a \$150 diamond being put out as an inducement. He kept just abreast of the time at the quarters, running in at the finish one second ahead, putting the new mark at 2:10 1-5.

THREE RECORDS WERE BROKEN BY WHEELMEN at Denver. Ziegler rode an unpaired mile in 2:09, Maddox an unpaired third in 0:38 3-5 and Taxis an unpaired eighth in 0:13.

Mr. C. J. Leitch made a great run on his wheel on Monday, traveling from Fleisherton to Orillia via Barrie in exactly eight hours, a distance of about 85 miles, taking breakfast within that time at Stayner.

[Fleisherton (Grey county) Advance.] In the report of the Sarnia bicycle races it was stated that Smith, of St. Thomas, won first; Phelps, Sarnia, second; and Harley, Petrolia, third. A. F. Little, of London, was the winner of first prize, and not Smith.

SHIPS THAT PASS IN A HURRY!

The Augusta Victoria Beats Her Own Good Record.

But the Campanian Relapses All Previous Brilliant Performances—Spans the Atlantic in Five Days, Nine Hours and Twenty-Nine Minutes.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—The Hamburg-American Packet Company's steamer Augusta Victoria broke her own record by nearly two hours and a half on this her 47th voyage from Southampton, arriving at the lights this morning at 5:49, making the run in 5 days, 19 hours and 19 minutes.

THE CAMPANIA BEATS EVERYTHING. NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—The big Cunarder greyhound Campanian broke all previous western records by 3 hours and 18 minutes, arriving at the Sandy Hook lightship at 5:45 p.m. today, making the run in 5 days, 9 hours and 29 minutes. The best previous record was that of the Lucania, made in October, 1893, which was 5 days, 12 hours and 47 minutes. The days' runs of the Campanian were as follows: From Southampton to New York, 5 days, 5 hours and 12 minutes; from New
