Tambling stuck close to Sherbrooke, and for nineteen laps out of the twenty kept within close range. One after another of the remaining competitors were passed at the same lively clip. On the twentieth round Sherbrooke settled down and increased his speed. So did Tambling. On the turn into the stretch | new mark at 2:10 1-5. the latter started to edge up. Little by little he pulled forward, until within 200 yards of the finish Tambling, bya desperate spurt, shoved the nose of his wheel about four feet ahead and kept it there to the end.
