Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 17.—The officers definitely appointed to the Canadian contingent are Lieut. Layborne, R.C.R.I., with Winnipeg Company; Capt. Watching Kimberley

The British Force There Confident of Holding Out.

Patriotic Demonstrations in London and Other Cities.
Cape Colony Has Called Out 12,500 Volunteers.

Question of a Possible Rising of Dutch Farmers Grows Serious—Boers Still Advancing—No Serious Conflict Has Occurred.

London, Tuesday, Oct. 17.—The war office is still in the region of surmise. There are rumors that the Boers have been repulsed at Mafeking and are attacking Vryburg. A Cape Town paper has a dispatch from the Orange River, stating that the telegraph wires have been cut between Vryburg and Kimberley, and it believed that the Boers are taking advantage of the presence of a large gathering of disloyal farmers at Vryburg, celebrating Nacthmal, to attack the town, hoping that the farmers will assist them against the British. The same dispatch says the British force at Kimberley is confident of its ability to hold out, but urges the immediate dispatch of a relief force.

PATRIOTIC FEELING.
The narrow city streets adjoining the Guildhall and Stock Exchange were densely crowded today. The immediate occasion was the meeting convened by the Lord Mayor of London, Sir John Voce Moore, to declare the confidence of business men in the city proper in the South African policy of the government. Hundreds of members of the stock and wool exchanges, and of the great banking and underwriting firms, formed processions in front of the various offices and marched to the Guildhall, singing the national airs and brandishing flags, accumulating recruits at every point. A band stationed in the orchestra gallery led off in patriotic airs, which were taken up by the audience, amid the waving of numberless Union Jacks. The Lord Mayor and sheriffs were loudly cheered on arriving, and the name of President Kruger provoked a storm of "Boos." The Lord Mayor presided. A resolution, extolling the premier, Lord Salisbury, and the secretary of state for the Colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, was proposed by Alderman Sir Reginald Hanson, seconded by Sir John Lubbock, Unionist member of parliament for London University, and enthusiastically adopted.

Patriotic demonstrations took place today at Birmingham, Crewe and other towns, from which reserves started for Aldershot. The Atlantic Transport Company, which leave the United States Government a ship for hospital purposes during the war with Spain, has now done Great Britain a similar service. The admiralty have gladly accepted the vessel, which will be named the Maine. Her Majesty has subscribed £600 to the Lord Mayor's fund for South African refugees, which has already reached £75,000.

BOER FUNDS GETTING LOW.
The Birmingham Post says there is excellent authority for the statement that several of the bonds given by Dr. Leyds, European representative of the Transvaal Government, and his agents for supplies purchased from continental firms have been dishonored. The supplies were purchased for the South African Republic, and payment is being pressed for. It is not likely, however, that the money will be forthcoming. It is strongly rumored that Lord's secret service fund has given out.

CAPE VOLUNTEERS.
The calling out of the Cape Colony volunteers is supplemented by a decision to raise 2,000 more volunteers in Cape Colony and 1,000 in Natal. Thus the total strength of the volunteer force in both places will amount to 12,500 men.

Prescriptions are being taken for the defense of Pietermaritzburg and Durban, in the remote contingency that the enemy may elude the vigilance of the British at the Ladysmith and Glencoe camps.

The news that the Boers had arrived at Dannhauser raised hopes that they would risk an engagement in the open, but it is now ascertained that the detachment which reached there was only a small advance body of Commandant-General Joubert's main column. The advance of the Boers was accompanied by some looting of stores at Newcastle and Guage. A refugee asserts that Commandant Viljoen's command contains a surprising number of Hollanders, Germans and Englishmen.

DISLOYAL DUTCH.
The question of a possible rising of the Dutch farmers in the northern portions of Cape Colony is very important. The Daily Mail's correspondent at Colesburg has been investigating regarding the matter, and on the whole says the chances are against a rising. He bases his conclusion on the prospect of good crops after four lean years, which, he believes, will predispose the farmers to peace. Nevertheless, there is serious disloyalty and much anti-British agitation in these districts, while the Free State Boers threaten an immediate invasion of Colesburg and All-wal North.

COMMUNICATION STOPPED.
The Commercial Cable Company has issued the following notice: "We are advised that the Natal administration announce that telegraphic communications with the Orange Free State and the Transvaal has been suspended. The Eastern Company notify us that censorship has been established at Aden on all messages for South Africa."

MAFEEKING AND KIMBERLEY.
Advices from Cape Town relate that excitement is kept up there by ceaseless reports of battles, but that calmness is visible in official circles, where the opinion prevails that Mafeking and Kimberley are safe. It is thought, too, that the Boers are not likely to attack Vryburg, in Bechuanaland, owing to the fact that the population of that district is largely Dutch. It is assumed that the refusal of the Boers to accept battle in Natal last week, when Gen. Sir George Stewart White advanced and endeavored to draw them through Van Reenen's Pass, indicates their unwillingness to commence hostilities. On the other hand, the Boers are probably too astute to play the British game, at the risk of an engagement on ground where artillery could be brought into play and cavalry moved rapidly.

A CAPE TOWN KICK.
The Daily Mail's correspondent asserts that Sir Alfred Milner is worked to death, and that Cape Town is crying out with bitter resentment against what is called the Schreiner cabinet's betrayal of Mafeking by its constant refusal to send a force of volunteer artillery thither. Many residents of Cape Town have relatives at Vryburg, and they are furious with Messrs. Merriman and Sauer, respectively, colonial treasurer and commissioner of public works, and the ministers are mobbed whenever they appear in public. Mr. Hoffmeyer, the Afrikaner leader, has gone to the scene of the outbursts of indignation. On Sunday night the streets were filled with angry citizens, and it was feared that rioting would occur. This, combined with the pressure of the imperial government, brought the Schreiner government to a sense of its peril, as well as of its duty, and moved it to decide to call out the volunteers. The ministerial party also worked its hardest to prevent the ovation to Mr. Conyngham Greene on his arrival from Pretoria, but failed. The volunteers are 7,000 strong, and have 11 pieces of artillery.

BOERS ADVANCING.
Dispatches from the Cape up to mid-night include an important message from Glencoe camp dated 3:35, Monday afternoon, announcing that the Boer commandos, which invaded Natal through Laing's Nek, and after occupying Newcastle advanced to Dannhauser, reaching Ingangene Sunday evening, their transport service being reported inefficient. This will delay the anticipated and hoped-for assault on the strong British position at Glencoe.

The Natal invasion was made in three columns at dawn on Oct. 11, through Bothas Pass, Laing's Nek and from Wakarusa, the objective point of the invaders being Newcastle. The Boers utilized several thousand natives who were tramping from the Rand to drive their heavy guns up Laing's Nek.

Dispatches from Dundee say that according to the reports of refugees the Boer invaders of Natal are estimated at 16,000. All the non-combatants and women and children have been sent from Dundee.

BLOODY WORK IN SOUTH AFRICA
300 Boers and 18 British Killed
In a Battle at Mafeking—Another Armored Train Engaged.
London, Oct. 17.—A special dispatch from Cape Town says that three hundred Boers and eighteen British have been killed in a battle at Mafeking.

FIGHT WITH ANOTHER ARMORED TRAIN.
Cape Town, Oct. 17.—It is reported here that the Boers have had an engagement with another armored train from Rhodesia.
Pretoria, Oct. 14.—Delayed in transmission.—As it has been discovered that attempts are being made to tamper with the railways, the landrosts have been authorized to shoot on sight all persons found near railways with dynamite.

ACCOUNT MAY BE EXAGGERATED
London, Oct. 17.—Today's news from the western border probably reduces the alleged heavy fighting at Mafeking to ordinary proportions. Apparently, the earlier sensational stories originated in the skirmishes between the armored train and small detachments of Boers, although since then much may have happened to the little garrison. It is difficult to understand how refugees arriving at Lorenzo Marquez should have come into possession of news of serious Boer losses at Mafeking. At the same time, it must be remembered that much news from the Transvaal is likely to come by way of Delagoa Bay, as most other channels are strictly censored.

gees who have just arrived here from the Transvaal report that the Boers have been repulsed at Mafeking, sustaining heavy losses.

Kimberley, Oct. 16.—An armored train, while reconnoitering near Spytfontein, engaged way Boers, killing five and wounding seven. The British had no losses.

FROM BOER SOURCES.
Pretoria, Oct. 14 (delayed in transmission).—Heavy fighting took place this morning north of Mafeking. An armored train sent to repair the railway line opened fire on the Boer command. One burgher was killed and two were wounded. A second engagement followed, in which nine British were wounded. Then, while Gen. Cronje's troops were near the broken railway bridge, nine miles north of Mafeking, an approaching train, loaded with dynamite, was fired upon and blown up. The result was no casualties on the Transvaal side.

Pretoria, Oct. 15 (delayed in transmission).—Further dispatch received by the government say that fighting continued north of Mafeking. The British, after the second engagement, retired in the direction of the town; but they resumed the attack shortly afterwards, two burghers being killed and three wounded. The commando engaged was impeded, owing to the want of heavy artillery, which was subsequently obtained from Gen. Cronje.

SEVENTY-FIVE OCEAN CARRIERS
SNAPPED UP.
New York, Oct. 17.—The British Government is seriously crippling the trans-Atlantic freight business by snapping up a number of vessels to be used as transports during the campaign against the Boers. Seventy-five ocean liners, it is reported, including 32 trans-Atlantic liners, have already been chartered.

COUNSELS CHARITY.
Cape Town, Oct. 16.—The archbishop has issued a pastoral earnestly reminding the clergy and laity that men of honor and integrity equal to their own may espouse the opposite side, seeing that warm friends and even families are divided in this crisis. In concluding the appeal he says: "I beg you all to avoid rash talking, and to endeavor to pave the way to a durable peace, and to friendly relations, when God's mercy the war shall be a thing of the past."

Alwal North, Cape Colony, is now isolated.

SPOKE A WORD FOR THE CREW

Miss Edyth Hyman's Testimony in the Scotsman Robbery Cases
In the preliminary trial at Montreal on Saturday, William Baynes, one of the crew of the Scotsman, was charged with stealing some chains, brooches, pins, a chateleine, etc. The articles had been found on the prisoner, and were deposited before the court. Miss Edyth Hyman, of this city, gave her deposition. She identified the jewelry produced as being her property. She had left the articles in a case in her cabin, the Friday morning of the wreck. She had also left in her cabin a valise, which did not lock, and some money in a little bag. The jewelry stolen was worth nearly £100. Miss Hyman did not recognize the accused.

Questioned by Mr. J. C. Walsh, counsel for the defense, the witness declared that she never offered any reward to sailors for bringing her some of the articles in her cabin. She heard only one passenger make these promises, and it was Mrs. Moore, of Hamilton. As a matter of fact, every passenger took the clothes he could get as long as they were not claimed by the owners. The sailors generally did not take the clothing of the passengers, as their own were sufficient. The crew, as a whole, behaved very orderly, and two days after being on the rocks, a vote of thanks was tendered them.

In reply to a question she said everybody was drinking on the rocks, but she noticed only one or two cases of intoxication among the crew.
