MARTIAL LAW. Cape Town, March 6. - Sir Alfred Milner has issued the following proclamation:

'Whereas the enemy's forces have invaded the districts of Prieska, Ken-hardt, Britstown and Barkly West. whereas many British subjects have taken up arms, and whereas it is necessary to repel invasion and suppress rebellion; now, therefore, martial law is hereby proclaimed in these districts.'

HEAVY COST OF ITS RELIEF.

London, Tuesday, March 6. - Winston Churchill, describing the relief of Ladysmith, says: "It was effected at a cost of upwards of 5,000 officers and men in an army only 25,000 strong." He goes on to pay a high tribute to Sir Redvers Buller, emphasizing the confidence his men had in him, "without which the enterprise could hardly have succeeded." Of Gen. Buller's attack on Feb. 27. Mr. Churchill says: "Considered in itself, it was a musterpiece, soundly conceived, gloriously won, and skill-fully executed. He adds that much also was due to the greatly improved intelligence department. Mr. Churchill points out that the Boers now Van Reenen's Pass, but that a majority of the Free Staters have accompanied the Transvalers northward.

> IN A GOOD PLACE. A dispatch to the Standard from Osfontein, dated Sunday, March 4, says: Lord Roberts' army now occupies a most advantageous position. The sixth division, under Kelly-Kenny, posted on the right, and holds all the kopjes for a distance of five miles south of the Modder. The seventh division, under Gen. Tucker, is in the center. immediately south of the river, and Gen. Colville, with the ninth division. is on the north bank. The cavalry brigade, under Gen. French, is posted on the left front, and the mounted infantry, under Col. Ridiey-Martyr, on the right bank. The country around consists of wide, grassy plains, broken

only by ridges and isolated kopjes. THE ENEMY.

A body of the enemy has taken up a position on one of the kopjes, a flattopped hill to the north of the river, five miles beyond Gen. French, who today took out his artillery and shelled them. Another force, 4,000 strong, holds and isolated group of kopjes south of the Modder, and in front of the British mounted infantry. Their position is surrounded on all sides by level plains, over which the Boers must make their way in order to reach the river. As a consequence, their situation appears precarious in the extreme. The veldt is now in beautiful condition. Water is plentiful, supplies being obtainable not only from the river, but also from numerous clear springs. The health and spirits of the troops are excellent. The British cavalry and mounted infantry have been reconnoitering the enemy's position. There has been little

of the south of the Modder River. BOER TREKKING CHECKED.

Osfontein, Saturday, March 3 .- Gen. French yesterday evening noticed a body of Boers trekking northwest, and sent a squadron last night to keep in touch with them. The troopers were followed by about 150 Boers, who advanced around a hill, but who retired precipitately when the British shelled them. The Boers then opened a heavy fire with Maxims, and also began fir-ing from a kopje in the center of the nosition with a long-range 15-pounder. The Boer trekking, in consequence of Gen. IMPROVING THEIR POSITION. The Boers fought tenaciously, contesting every inch of the ground, but ultimately they retreated suddenly, carrying off their guns and wagons. A mounted force pursued them, but the result is not yet known. The British casualties during the two days were 12 or 13 killed. The Boers' losses are

unknown. Throughout the arduous fighting and severe fatigue, the colonials have be-

haved splendidly. BEHIND PEPWORTH HILL. Ladysmith, Saturday, March 3.-Three regiments of cavalry reconnoitering northwards today saw a body of Boers behind Pepworth Hill. Two long trains, which were ready to leave promptly, moved before the troops reached them, and the Boers blew up a culvert behind them as they went. The British passed a large body of Boers in the vicinity of Pepworth. The Boers opened a heavy rifle fire, British field guns replying. The British did not press the attack and the Boer fire ceased on the British retiring. The Boer camps showed many

evidences of the presence of women. AUCTION OF BOER LOOT. An auction was held of things brought from the Boer camp. A bunch of grapes sold for 25 shillings; a plate of tomatoes brought 18 shillings; 2 dozen matches brought 13 shillings; a package of cigarettes 25 shillings: 50 cigars brought £10, and a quarter of a pound of plug tobacco 45 shillings.
