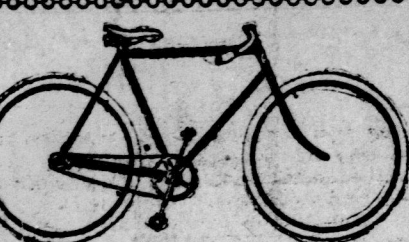

Toronto, April 25—8 p.m.—The pressure has decreased considerably in the Northwest Territories and rain is falling generally from the Rockies to Manitoba. The highest pressure now covers the lower lake region, and the weather continues very fine in Ontario and Quebec. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 42-52; Kamloops, 42-50; Calgary, 40-46; Qu'Appelle, 50-56; Winnipeg, 50-76; Port Arthur, 30-56; Parry Sound, 32-64; Toronto, 40-56; Ottawa, 34-60; Montreal, 38-60; Quebec, 32-56; Halifax, 34-42.

Local temperatures: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Wednesday, April 25, were: Highest, 67°; lowest, 47.5°.

Today the sun rose at 5:18 a.m. and set at 7:14 p.m. The moon rose at 3:27 and set at 4:39 p.m.

—On Tuesday last Mr. H. S. Saunders gave a most delightful talk to the Froebel Society on the subject of birds. Mr. Saunders had specimens of a large number of birds and nests. He said the main object of a bird's life, next to getting food, was to keep out of danger. According to some authorities, no bird died a natural death, and figures showing the mortality of certain birds were quoted. The bills of birds were shown as a main point in classification, and the habits and appearance of some members of the common classes described. The society hope that Mr. Saunders will be kind enough to resume his talk at another time.

—There will be a special meeting of those interested in the Red Cross Society at the city hall tomorrow at 4 p.m. Reports of committees and other urgent business comes up. It has been decided to hold an organ recital at the First Methodist Church on the evening of May 1. THEY INCREASED HIS SALARY

The Members of St. James' Presbyterian Church Recognize Their Pastor's Worth—Board of Management Elected—Reports Received.

Last night the congregation of St. James' Presbyterian Church met in the Sunday school room and completed the business that had not been considered at the annual meeting in January. The pastor, Rev. J. A. McGillivray, presided, and Mr. James Gray officiated as secretary.

In order that the new members of the church, of whom there are a large number, might have some voice in the selection of managers, the old board resigned in a body at the first of the year, and consequently it was necessary to choose a new board. For the one-year term, ending Dec. 31, Messrs. T. A. Rowat, W. T. Brown, J. Hutton and W. B. Walker were chosen; for two years, Messrs. P. J. Thompson, B. A. John Moore, Aid. Douglass, and T. H. McCurdy; for three years, Dr. Thomson, W. McNaughton, Gilleen McLean and P. Henderson. Of these Messrs. Brown, Hutton, Douglass, McCurdy and McNaughton were members of the former board.

The reports of the Y. P. S. C. E. and the Sunday school were presented and adopted. The latter showed nearly 300 members on the roll with an average attendance of 220.

As an evidence of the congregation's appreciation of Mr. McGillivray's good work and untiring energy, his salary was increased from \$1,400 to \$1,600, the increase to date from the first of the year. Mr. McGillivray acknowledged this kindness gratefully, and assured the congregation that his entire time would be devoted to them now that the church was completed. He added that 70 new members had been received since the church opened, three months ago.

A vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring managers, and the meeting closed with the benediction.

BURNED OUT.

Dominion City, Man., April 26.—Wadell's elevator, with 20,000 bushels of grain, was completely destroyed by fire Tuesday night. The elevator was owned by the Winnipeg Elevator Company, and insured for about \$2,000.

Nelson, B. C., April 26.—The new block of P. Burns was partially destroyed by fire Tuesday afternoon. The damage is estimated at \$5,000.

St. Thomas, April 26.—Calkon, on the town line between Bayham and Malahide, was visited by a disastrous fire on Monday night. T. M. White's store and dwelling being totally destroyed. The store and stock was insured for \$2,000, and furniture in house for \$300. Companies interested are The Gore and London Mutual. Mr. White's loss will be in the neighborhood of \$2,000.

She was condemned for contempt of court and sent back to jail under a strong guard.
