with the result that they fled as soon as our guns were turned upon them. The fight raged most flercely on the left, but our guns soon silenced the enemy, who were seen flying in all di-

Those on the left flank, finding that their comrades in front had abandoned their positions, ran helter-skelter. Then ensued the finest Boer-hunting witnessed during the war. The dismounted British plied the enemy with riflefire, while the pom-poms hustled them until not a single Boer was left in front of us. The Canadiansh kept busy on the

right, replying with their seven-pound-er to the enemy's biggest gun until darkness fell upon the scene." LEYDS AND KRUGER ARE OUT.

Dr. Leyds, according to the Brussels correspondent of the Daily Express, has quarreled with the Transvaal Government. A representative of President Kruger is alleged to have demanded an account respecting £500,-000 that has passed through Dr. Leyds' hands. Dr. Leyds is said to have replied that the money had all been ex-pended, and expressed indignation when asked for an itemized statement.

President Kruger's representative is described as showing to Dr. Leyds certain ante-war letters, in which Germany and France said they would intervene, and Dr. Leyds, acording to this report, grabbed the documents and threw them into the fire, having a bodily struggle with the emissary. These alleged includents are cited to explain the recent reserve of Dr. Leyds.

BETHUNE'S BLUNDER. The ensnaring of the squadron of Bethune's Horse appears to have been quite as bad as was at first reported. Gen. Bethune thinking that there were no Boers at Vryheid, determined to go that way toward Newcastle, as a short cut. The advance squadron was hurrying to make Vryheid before dark. It left the main body behind and trotted into the ambush. The Boers had maxims, and the British seeing they had no chance to retire, dashed forward to a point within 20 yards of the Boer rifles. Five officers and 63 men were killed or wounded. Bethune ordered his four squadrons

The damage to Laings Nek tunnel is capable of prompt repair. The strength of the Boers at that point is not known. Probably they have from 5,000 to 6,000 men.
