Special Significance of Conferring the Garter on Germany's Crown Prince.

Friendly Relations Between the Two Royal Families Emphasized by King Edward---Sunday To Be a Day of Universal Mourning in the British Empire.

Daily Mail, King Edward, when presenting the insignia of the Order of the Garter to Crown Prince Frederick William, said it had been his mother's

wish herself to confer the Garter. "His majesty then dwelt upon the friendly relations between the two royal families," says the Daily Mail, "relations which had been so closely proved by the present visit of the Emperor William, who had arrived in time to be recognized by his royal grandmother, and whose consideration and feeling had so deeply touched the nation, which keenly appreciated his

THE KING'S WISH.

"Then turning to Emperor William, the King gave expression to his deep feeling for him, saying that he (the King) and the British royal family esteemed him not only in virtue of their blood relationship, but for all the great qualities of the kaiser, and in particular they valued his long sojourn of consolation in England. The King said he trusted that those friendly relations would always con-tinue, and that the two nations might in common understanding continue to work together in the cause of peace

NO BUSINESS SATURDAY. Practically all business will be suspended Saturday. The stores will not open except in the poorer quarters. The route of the funeral procession will be draped with black throughout. The gun carriage bearing the coffin will drawn by six cream-colored Flemish by the late time of the diamond jubilee, and the same harness will be used, covered with crape. GUN-CARRIAGES TO BE KHAKI COLOR.

The gun-carriages to be used at Cowes, Windsor, and in London will be painted the color of khaki and fitted with rubber tires. King Edward has commanded Mr. A. Forestier, the well-known artist of Black and White, to draw the lying-in-state for him. The King and Queen, with the kaiser, will attend the memorial service in St. George's Chapel, Windsor, Sunday.

ROUTE OF THE PROCESSION. It has been decided to extend the route, which is now fixed to pass Buckingham Palace, through St. James' Park and past St. James' Palace to Piccadilly; then along Piccadilly to Hyde Park, emerging at the marble arch; then along Edgeware road to Paddington station. This is double the length of the route originally intended, and will occupy fully two hours. similar reasons the route at Windsor has been extended to include High street, Park street and Long Walk

before entering the castle. The funeral procession will leave Os-borne House, Isle of Wight, Friday, at 2 p.m. The route to the pier will be lined with troops and the royal personages will follow the coffin on foot.

THE PERIOD OF MOURNING. A supplement of the Gazette an-nounces that it is not desired that the public shall wear deep mourning after March 6, but that half-mourning should be worn until April 17. There has been a strong outcry from manufacturers and merchants at a prolonged period of mourning.

Following the precedent of 1768, when the city merchants petitioned George III. to curail the period of mourning, trade circles in the United Kingdom had started a petition to King Edward VII. begging him to limit the period of national mourning.
On previous occasions the King as Prince of Wales, used his influence inthis direction, and now, as King, he has asserted his will-known opposition to the observance of long periods of official mourning.

MILITARY SERVICES.

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 28.—A militia general order issued tonight asks officers commanding permanent corps of the citadel, Quebec, to arrange for me-morial services in memory of the late Queen. Active militia will be invited to attend. Salutes of 101 guns will be fired at saluting stations at 11:30 a.m. Saturday. Another militia order provides that the period of mourning will expire on July 24. The mourning to be worn by officers of the Canadian militia in memory of the late Queen will be a piece of black crape, 31/4

inches wide, round the left arm. There will be no general order for any military church parade throughout the Dominion on the occasion of her late majesty's funeral. The permanent corps will parade on Saturday, and the Ottawa brigade will parade in connection with the state memorial service at Christ Church Cathedral. The D. O. C.s of the various military districts will be instructed to invite church parades of the brigades under their command for whatever day the local memorial service will be held, and the commanding officers of the detached battalions will be invited to parade on the day fixed for the memorial services

BRITISH OCCUPIED CAROLINA

Smith-Dorrien's Men Got There After a Hard Fight.

Number of Boers Captured by Steinacker's Troops-Movements of the Raiders.

London, Jan. 28.-A Pretoria dispatch today says: Gen. Smith-Dorrien has occupied Carolina after a stout resistance. NUMBER OF BOERS CAPTURED. Durban, Natal, Jan. 28.-Steinacher's Horse, a colonial irregular troop, which is at Komatipoort, has captured a number of prisoners and taken a number of cattle. A number of Boer families with cattle and wagons have sur-

rendered in the same neighborhood. The treason court is daily convicting and sentencing rebels to terms of imprisonment ranging from six months to three years.

Cape Town, Jan. 28. — According to the Argus, the disaffected Dutch in the Stellenbosch district declare that though they revered Queen Victoria, they do not owe allegiance to King Edward. It is inferred that they will openly join the Boers invading the Cape Colony.

The British Government has purchased a magnificent block of buildings in the center of Lorenzo Marquez for consulate and office purposes.
