STATUE IN QUEEN'S PARK,

TORONTO.

Toronto, Jan. 28.—The provincial grant for the statue of Queen Victoria, to be erected in Queen's Park, will be \$10,000, and it is expected that the city corporation will supplement that by another \$5,000 at least. Premier Ross, speaking as a private citizen, suggests that the erection of an industrial and art museum for Ontario, at a cost of half a million, would be the most fitting and lasting memorial to the Queen. This, of course, in addition to the statue in the park.

THE QUEEN HAD WISHED TO DO IT

Special Significance of Conferring the Garter on Germany's Crown Prince.

Friendly Relations Between the Two Royal Families Emphasized by King Edward—Sunday To Be Day of Universal Mourning in the British Empire.

London, Jan. 29.—According to the Daily Mail, King Edward, when presenting the insignia of the Order of the Garter to Crown Prince Frederick William, said it had been his mother's wish herself to confer the Garter.

"His majesty then dwelt upon the friendly relations between the two royal families," says the Daily Mail, "relations which had been so closely proved by the present visit of the Emperor William, who had arrived in time to be recognized by his royal grandmother, and whose consideration and feeling had so deeply touched the nation, which keenly appreciated his action."

THE KING'S WISH.

"Then turning to Emperor William, the King gave expression to his deep feeling for him, saying that he (the King) and the British royal family esteemed him not only in virtue of their blood relationship, but for all the great qualities of the Kaiser, and in particular they valued his long sojourn of consolation in England. The King said he trusted that those friendly relations would always continue, and that the two nations might in common understanding continue to work together in the cause of peace."

NO BUSINESS SATURDAY.

Practically all business will be suspended Saturday. The stores will not open except in the poorer quarters. The route of the funeral procession will be draped with black throughout. The gun carriage bearing the coffin will be drawn by six cream-colored Flemish horses used by the late Queen at the time of the diamond jubilee, and the same harness will be used, covered with crape. The silver and the brass inscription plates bear in old English letters the names and titles of her majesty.

It was officially announced last evening that King Edward had ordered Saturday to be observed as a day of general mourning.

PURPLE THE MOURNING COLOR.

By order of the King, the office of the works directs that all draperies displayed by the citizens shall be of purple.

The procession from St. George's Chapel Royal, at Windsor, to Frogmore, has been postponed. The coffin will remain in the chapel until the day of interment, which will probably be Monday.

Emperor William has commanded Count von Wedel, master of the horse, to bring six of his majesty's hangers from Berlin, and the Kaiser, the crown prince and other Germans in official attendance at the funeral will ride in the procession.

GUN-CARRIAGES TO BE KHAKI COLOR.

The gun-carriages to be used at Cowes, Windsor, and in London will be painted the color of khaki and fitted with rubber tires. King Edward has commanded Mr. A. Forester, the well-known artist of Black and White, to draw the lying-in-state for him. The King and Queen, with the Kaiser, will attend the memorial service in St. George's Chapel, Windsor, Sunday.

ROUTE OF THE PROCESSION.

It has been decided to extend the route, which is now fixed to pass Buckingham Palace, through St. James' Park and past St. James' Palace to Piccadilly, then along Piccadilly to Hyde Park, emerging at the marble arch; then along Edgeware road to Paddington station. This is double the length of the route originally intended, and will occupy fully two hours. For similar reasons the route at Windsor has been extended to include High street, Park street and Long Walk before entering the castle.

The funeral procession will leave Osborne House, Isle of Wight, Friday, at 2 p.m. The route to the pier will be lined with troops and the royal personages will follow the coffin on foot.

THIRTY-EIGHT WARSHIPS.

An order issued by Admiral Sir Chas. B. Boscawen shows that 38 British vessels will take part in the naval display.

The Queen Regent of Spain has ordered the cruiser Emperor Carlos V. to proceed to Spithead tomorrow to participate in the naval display.

The Crown Prince of Sweden and Norway has started for London to attend the funeral of Queen Victoria.

The period of the Gazette announces that it is not desired that the public shall wear deep mourning after March 6, but that half-mourning should be worn until April 17. There has been a strong outcry from manufacturers and merchants at a prolonged period of mourning.

Following the precedent of 1763, when the city merchants petitioned George III. to curtail the period of mourning, trade circles in the United Kingdom had started a petition to limit the period of national mourning. On previous occasions the King as Prince of Wales, used his influence in this direction, and now, as King, he has asserted his will-known opposition to the observance of long periods of official mourning.

BRITISH OCCUPIED CAROLINA

Smith-Dorrien's Men Got There After a Hard Fight.

Number of Boers Captured by Steinacker's Troops—Movements of the Raiders.

London, Jan. 28.—A Pretoria dispatch today says: Gen. Smith-Dorrien has occupied Carolina after a stout resistance.

NUMBER OF BOERS CAPTURED.

Durban, Natal, Jan. 28.—Steinacker's Horse, a colonial irregular troop, which is at Komatipoort, has captured a number of prisoners and taken a number of cattle. A number of Boer families with cattle and wagons have surrendered in the same neighborhood.

The treason court is daily convicting and sentencing rebels to terms of imprisonment ranging from six months to three years.

At Oudtshoorn, Saturday, Col. Byng and Williams came in contact with a large party of invaders and drove them into the valley the Kruger.

The same day Col. Grenfell forced another body of Boers to retreat, leaving their horses and carts in his possession.

THE RAIDERS.

Ventersburg Road, Orange River Colony, Saturday, Jan. 26.—Generals Dewet and Patterson, with 500 Boers, crossed the railroad between here and Haffontein, Jan. 23. Twenty-five British in ambush killed five of the Boers.

Cape Town, Jan. 28.—According to the Argus, the disaffected Dutch in the Stellenbosch district declare that though they revered Queen Victoria, they do not owe allegiance to King Edward. It is inferred that they will openly join the Boers invading the Cape Colony.

The British Government has purchased a magnificent block of buildings in the center of Lorenzo Marques for consulate and office purposes.

RETURNED CANADIANS.

Halifax, Jan. 28.—The royal mail steamer Montfort reached port this evening from Liverpool after a somewhat boisterous passage. Among the passengers were Lieut. John Taylor, of Strathcona's Horse, and Walter Peck, Bernard Hodgkins, Lieut. G. W. Ralph, and C. H. Carrison, of the West India Regiment. The members of the Canadian contingents on board were: Serjeants S. H. Eys, C. M. R., Fort McLeod; Pte. T. A. Bird, C. M. R., Prince Albert; N. W. T. Pte. W. B. Flinn, C. M. R., Vancouver; Pte. S. H. Hodgkin, C. M. R., Edmonton; Pte. W. H. Clay, Strathcona Horse; Pte. H. W. Pte. W. Pte. W. Woodward, Strathcona Horse, Vancouver; Pte. W. Dawson, Strathcona Horse, Fort McLeod; Pte. W. D. Wallace, C. M. R., Westminster; Pte. Gerhardt, R. C. R., Toronto; Driver C. King, R. C. A., London, Ont.; Color-Sergeant R. Davies, R. C. R., Quebec. The draft was in charge of Lieut. Taylor.

HEROES HONORED.

The citizens of Colborne, Ont., and vicinity met in Temperance Hall Friday evening to welcome home their honored citizen soldiers. After brief addresses by Revs. Parker and Watson, the chairman introduced Sergt. Willoughby and Ptes. Brown, Cameron and Cockburn, the returned soldiers. Four little girls on behalf of the citizens presented to each of the soldiers a "solid gold" watch, bearing the recipient's name and a suitable inscription.

Dr. Willoughby gave an excellent address on the service rendered by the Canadian soldiers. In view of the Queen's death the proposed banquet was postponed.

TO SERVE UNDER "B. P."

Toronto, Jan. 28.—The tales of hardship and privation related by the men who have served in South Africa apparently have very little effect on the military ardor of the young men of Toronto. Stanley Barracks is besieged daily by hundreds of Canadian enlistment. Every man is given an application form to be filled out and sent to the adjutant-general, Ottawa.

While a large proportion of the recruits will be drawn from the North-west, about 50 will be recruited from the Toronto district. Lieut.-Col. Young stated that no regular enlistment would take place until the arrival of Major Ford, of the Strathcona Horse.

Gunner Duncan McGregor, now of Howard's Canadian Scouts, and formerly of C Battery, says that at time of writing (Dec. 15) all the Canadian boys with "B. P." were in good health. They expected to leave Pretoria for the front about Jan. 1.

Serjts. Hazelton, Alcroft and Hirstey, all of A Battery, Kingston, will leave in a few days to join Baden-Powell's force.
