SNOW BLOCKADE BROKEN

Stalled Trains in Nebraska and Wyoming Released.

Fifty Passengers Buried Under Ten Feet of Snow Twenty Hours.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Dec. 22.—The snow blockade on the Union Pacific Railway between Cheyenne and Sydney, Neb., has been raised. The loss of live stock will be less heavy than was anticipated.

Fifty passengers on a Burlington train running from Denver to Lakewood who had been buried beneath ten feet of snow for twenty hours, were rescued unharmed last night.

Omaha, Neb., Dec. 22.—The passenger trains which were blocked by snow in the western part of the state began to arrive this morning from 3 to 60 hours late. The Union Pacific suffered the most, although the Rock Island and Burlington trains were badly delayed by the blockade.

Lima, Peru, Dec. 22.—News has just reached here of a terrible storm of hail and snow, accompanied by thunder and lightning, Dec. 14, at Carro De Pasco, 107 miles from here. Several persons were killed and much damage was done.

Vanderbilt's Condition.
New York, Dec. 22.—The physicians attending Cornelius Vanderbilt have made public the following bulletin: "Mr. Vanderbilt has a very restless night and is still seriously ill. His general condition and temperature remain about the same. Any slight changes, perhaps, are on the side of improvement."

The usual early evening consultation of the physicians who are attending Cornelius Vanderbilt was not held tonight. Dr. Flint said he thought no bulleins would be issued before tomorrow. Dr. DeLaford said tonight: "Mr. Vanderbilt is better, but he is still a sick man. He has been critically ill for a week, and is not yet out of danger, but there is every reason to believe that he will recover."

Death of Prominent Spiritualist.
White Water, Wis., Dec. 22.—Morris Pratt, of this city, one of the early converts to spiritualism and founder of the only school in the world devoted to instruction in spiritualism, is dead from the effects of a paralytic stroke. He was born in Madison County, N. Y., 82 years ago, and came to Wisconsin in the early fifties.

Mascagni's Disfortunes.
Chicago, Dec. 22.—The tour of Pietro Mascagni and his Italian opera company to a sudden close today in this city, with the cancellation of all dates. The cancellation of Mascagni's tour came when an attachment was made on his personal effects by a constable representing a local claimant for \$134. Mascagni was now confined to his bed suffering from nervous prostration.

CROWN PRINCESS DROPS FROM SIGHT OF EUROPE

Utterly Lost to Police of Every Kingdom for Ten Days.

Searches in Every Direction Have Been Absolutely Fruitless.

Dresden, Saxony, Dec. 22.—The Crown Princess of Saxony fled from her home during the night of Dec. 11-12. The Dresden Journal today says: "The Princess, in a state of intense mental excitement, suddenly deserted her family at Salzburg and went abroad. The Saxons court functions for the winter, including the New Year's reception, have been cancelled. The foregoing paragraph in today's official Journal, which was inserted by order of the King and Crown Prince, has turned into a truth what for several days past has been regarded as an incredible tale. The Crown Princess, surrounded by her ladies in waiting and numerous attendants and servants of the royal household, has vanished so utterly that the police of every kingdom of Europe have for ten days been unable to trace her. The official announcement was made in order to obtain the aid of the general public in finding the Princess, as because the Crown Prince has preferred to remain in retirement at Salzburg rather than to return to her husband and children at Dresden cannot longer be maintained."

Accompanied by the Crown Prince, the Princess went to the castle of Emperor Francis Joseph, near Salzburg, a month ago. A week after their arrival at the castle the Prince broke his leg while hunting, and was brought back to Dresden. The Princess, however, still remained at the castle. Why she did so the people of the court did not know, except that the Princess, with gloomy tenacity, usually does what she wants. For a little while this explanation sufficed; then the gossip began to reach Dresden. It was said that the Princess had surrendered herself to periods of nervous excitement, and that she had been in a state of mental derangement. The Princess caused much concern to her suite and to some of her Austrian kinsfolk who were staying in the castle with her. It is now believed that she was under surveillance. The narrative of the

events at Salzburg during the night of Dec. 11 and 12, as told in Dresden, is that the Princess, who appeared to be in an unusually tranquil mood, retired to bed at 10 o'clock and after the music in the saloon.

A DUMMY FIGURE.

Three hours later, when a maid looked in the royal bedchamber something in the appearance of the bed prompted her to go closer and examine it. Instead of the Princess the maid perceived a dummy figure. She awakened the lady in waiting and the latter, with the other members of the Princess' suite, searched all the neighboring apartments, then the entire castle, and finally the grounds of the castle, but no trace of the Princess was found. At dawn the police of Salzburg were informed of the disappearance and inquiries were made throughout the whole countryside, but with no tangible result. The inquiry by the end of that day had extended to all parts of the Kingdom of Saxony, and on authority from Dresden the flight of the second daughter of all of Europe. The theory of suicide was suggested, and a fruitless search for the Princess has been made. All the ponds and outdoor pools of water in the vicinity of the castle have been dragged without result. The disappearance of the Princess will doubtless cause the circulation of many stories. It is already related that she eloped, but inquiries made here have brought out nothing to substantiate or support this supposition.

The flight of the Crown Princess of Saxony has caused great excitement at Dresden. It is reported that the Archduke Ferdinand, accompanied by one of the court chamberlains, went to Geneva, whether it was supposed the Princess had fled, but failed to find any trace of her. The Princess' brother, the Archduke Leopold Ferdinand, is said to be with her, but nothing can be ascertained as to her whereabouts. It is officially explained that the Princess' disappearance is due to mental derangement. The Duke of Tuscany, for counseling her to forgive her husband. She is said to be en route. It is rumored here tonight that the Princess was accompanied by the French tutor of her children.

KING EDWARD'S MESSAGE TO MINTO

His Majesty Delighted With Marconi's Success—Closely Touch With Canada.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 22.—The following cable dispatch was received today from His Majesty the King by the Governor-General:

"London, Dec. 22, 1902. 'I am much interested in the wireless message which you have sent me, and I am delighted at the success of Signor Marconi's great invention which brings Great Britain and Canada into still closer connection.'"

(Signed) EDWARD R."

London, Dec. 22.—Representatives of the Marconi Company say they have been receiving trans-Atlantic messages for a week. They add that the messages to King Edward and others came through without a hitch and practically instantaneously. The instant the key was pressed in Nova Scotia, the receiver at London, Cornwall, answered. It is calculated that the company will be able to handle 1,000 words an hour. So as soon as it is able to receive messages, the company will connect London with the inland telegraph the company will commence regular commercial business between Cornwall and Nova Scotia.

Coal Mines Flooded.
Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 22.—At the office of the Reading Company it was announced today that four of the company's collieries in the Schuylkill region are flooded, and that other operations are seriously handicapped.

EARL OF ROSSLYN FLEECE A CARDS

Passenger on Etruria, "Doc," Owens, and Two Others, Found Him Easy.

New York, Dec. 22.—Ocean card sharps played poker with the actor-nobleman, James Francis Harry St. Clair-Erskine, the fifth Earl of Rosslyn, at a game of cards on the Etruria, which ended yesterday. The Earl lost \$210, or about \$1,500, but suspected no dishonesty until the arrival of the Etruria.

A cablegram awaited the captain of the Cunarder from the home office in Liverpool, directing him to cause the arrest of three gentlemen, the officers of the ship were not quick enough, and only one man was arrested. He described himself as Jerome McKay, 36 years old, a capitalist, of Harrisburg, Pa.

When he embarked on the liner the Earl quickly made the acquaintance of three "good fellows," with whom he played at first for small stakes. They were all strangers to one another—card sharps always are.

One of the Earl's friends lost a small sum, and to furnish him with an opportunity to reverse his losses a game was proposed. The "sport" continued, and the Earl lost his \$210 in the most good-natured way, the noble actor supposing it to be a harmless game.

The arrival of the cablegram, as the passengers were disembarking, aroused the Earl of Rosslyn to action. Detectives of the London police, who were on board, and they quickly arrested the man who figured on the London passenger list as Jerome McKay, of Harrisburg.

The other men wanted made their escape. Leeson took McKay in a cab to police headquarters and the Earl followed in another cab. McKay was locked up, charged with being a suspicious person.

The Earl inspected the Rogues' Gallery and picked out "Doc," Owens, a notorious ocean card crook, as one of the men who had fleeced him. When the Oceanic sailed on her last trip to New York, Detective Moody and Leeson and Detective Manly, of the White Star Line, found Owens on board. They warned him not to play cards, and he replied that he was going to New York for his health. The police are now looking for Owens, who has been barred from ocean steamers again and again during the last three years.

WEALTH DISTRIBUTED

Savings of Toronto's Miser May Be Spent in Law.

Toronto, Dec. 22.—The estate of Eli Hyman, the miser, who died the other day, will have to contribute \$5,000 in succession duties. Samuel King, solicitor for the widow, has tendered a bond for \$10,000 to the solicitor of the treasury department. Temporary administration of the estate has been granted. Five per cent must be paid to the province. Half of the estate will be inherited by Mrs. Sophia Hyman, the wife, and the balance will go to the children. They are two girls and a son, the issue of the first marriage. This marriage has not been established, however, and the children will be forced to make the necessary showing. There is no record of such marriage, but many Jews in the city are sure that Hyman had a family before he married Miss Hamilton, the wife known here.

This promises to develop a law suit, especially if a prior marriage is established and the present Mrs. Hyman cannot show a divorce. From something that the old miser tried to tell Rabbi Jones in his dying moments, it is probable that Hyman had a large amount of money secretly hidden away that has not been accounted for, but the secret died with him.

Lorenz at Boston.

Boston, Mass., Dec. 22.—Dr. Adolph Lorenz, reached Boston today. During the afternoon he held a clinic at the Children's Hospital to illustrate his bloodless method of treating congenital dislocation of the hip. Only physicians, especially surgeons who treat children, were invited to the clinic. It is expected that Dr. Lorenz will give a second clinic tomorrow for the benefit of the surgeons of New England, not residing in Boston. At today's clinic three little girls, aged 7, 4 and 8 years, were operated upon, and afterwards Dr. Lorenz said the operations were successful.

HER HUNT ENDS AT POTTER'S FIELD

Mrs. Rogers Wept at Pitiful Grave of Brother She Sought Ten Years.

New York, Dec. 22.—After having reposed in a grave in Potter's Field on Hart's Island for more than ten years—a grave marked only by a wooden cross at the head, and on the cross only a number—all that was left of the body of Charles Rogers, who died on May 14, 1892, was exhumed, placed in a polished oak coffin with solid silver handles and name plate, and was buried yesterday in Cypress Hills Cemetery. Soon a handsome monument will be placed over the new grave.

A sister's constant, faithful love is responsible for discovering this man's body, buried as one of the thousands of the city's unclaimed dead. For more than ten years she had searched throughout Europe, South Africa and America for a trace of her brother.

Two months ago Miss Rogers arrived in New York and immediately began a thorough search of the statistics of the board of health to find if her brother had died in this city. At last she found an entry showing that a Charles Rogers had died on Randall's Island on May 14, 1892, and she went to Undertaker John J. Moloney, in East Twenty-sixth street, and asked him to aid her in searching for a clue to this Charles Rogers' identity, for he might not be her brother.

The undertaker last Friday found a picture of the Charles Rogers recorded in his books. He showed it to Miss Rogers identified it as the photograph of her brother. Then she went to Hart's Island and wept where she saw the pitiful-looking grave that contained her brother's remains. It was one of a long row of little mounds. She ordered the best and most expensive burial and paid with a certified check.

Miss Rogers was extensively gowned, wore jewels, and said that her sister was in Australia at the present time hunting for their brother, Charles Rogers, she said, was a diamond dealer, who traveled the world over in quest of patronage. She had been searching for him she had been through the diamond mines of South Africa, and had visited the diamond centers of the big cities of the world.

The Bellevue records showed that her brother had applied on May 7, 1892, for treatment for a severe cold, that he was transferred to Randall's Island and died a week later.

SHIP TOOK FIRE; BLEW UP AT SEA

Residents of East Gloucester, Mass., Saw a Large Craft Blaze and Disappear.

Gloucester, Mass., Dec. 22.—A large vessel, whose identity is unknown, was destroyed off Eastern Point late this afternoon.

The residents of East Gloucester heard what they thought was the noise of an explosion at about 4 o'clock. Lightkeeper Bailey, in the tower of the Eastern Point lighthouse, at the same time saw a large column of smoke ascending from the sea to the southeast of the light. He immediately fired a signal gun and waved a torch to summon the Dolliver's Neck life-saving crew.

Capt. King and his men immediately put off, getting outside the point about midnight. At first it was thought that the burning craft was about three miles off shore. After rowing several miles outside Eastern Point sail was put on the lifeboat. In all a distance of seven miles to sea was traversed.

The sea became very rough sweeping over the boat at times. Capt. King decided to turn back. He saw enough of pine that pervaded the air he is inclined to think the vessel may have been laden with lumber. Others think it may have been an oil steamer or a barge.

A fishing vessel was seen from Capt. King's boat and the burning ship when the life-saving boat turned back. Hundreds watched the fire at sea from the high ground of East Gloucester.

When the burning vessel was first viewed from the middle bank, which was discovered several fathoms were in the vicinity, so that there is a

probability that the crew took to the boats and were picked up.

The burning vessel was distinctly visible at 9 o'clock tonight.
