When I graduated from Yale there were only two multi-millionaires in the United States, John Jacob Astor and Comodore Vanderbilt. Neither of them at that period had reached the \$10,000,000 limit. There were not in the whole country twenty people worth a million Today there are more than dollars. one hunderd in Pittsburg alone who have passed that figure. There were then no trusts, no great combinations of capital, and no concentration of industries. These have made possible our in instrial advance and superiority over other nations. They have increased the scale of wages and enlarged the area of employment. They have given vast power to a few men who are being closely watched and who have in their hands vast responsibilities which are accompanied by great perils. The misuse of these great powers, the exercise of them oppressively, the imposition of burdens upon the people beyond reasonable returns for capital invested, the failure to recognize the rights of all, will be sure to react in drastic measures of legislation.
