PLANS DECLARED SATISFACTORY

Tenders for the Isolation Hospital Will Be Called for at Once.

The new plans of the Isolation Hospital were approved of by the special hospital committee last night and tenders will be called for at once. The plans were in by May 8. Messrs. J. C. Judd and Geo. B. Harris of the hospital trust were present, and declared that so far as the trust was concerned the plans were perfectly suitable. No objection could be found with them at all. It was their opinion that the hospital could be built well within the appropriation.

The plans had also been approved of by the board of health and many physicians of the city. Mayor Stevely thought that there was nothing for the committee to do approve the plans and call for tenders. He would move to that effect, with the proviso that the tenders for heating cover both the hot water and the blast system.

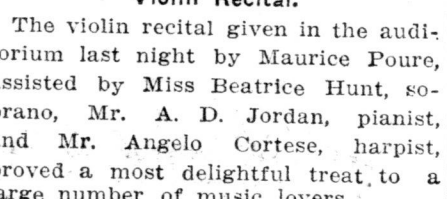
Tuberculosis Tent.
Ald. Stewart reported that he had at the solicitation of the committee investigated a suitable site for the tuberculosis tent, and he was of the opinion that a site could be obtained on the city farm.

At the rear of the city farm was a high ridge, with splendid elevation, a considerable distance from the river and with plenty of good spring water. Assistant City Engineer Kirkpatrick had also visited the place and thought it perfectly suitable. The city had no other site to offer.

On motion of Ald. Booth, it was decided to offer this site for the tuberculosis tent.

The tuberculosis exhibit will be given here during the first week in May. Chairman Stewart reported. He and Dr. Niven, chairman of the board of health, were appointed a committee to make all necessary arrangements.

THE MEMOIRS OF GREAT ADMIRAL

Lord Falmouth About To Publish Memoirs of the Celebrated Boscawen

London, April 16.—Lord Falmouth, who is about to publish the memoirs of his celebrated ancestor, Admiral Boscawen, one of the greatest naval commanders of the first half of the eighteenth century, is doubly a peer of the realm.

For while he succeeded his father as seventh Viscount Falmouth, he became through the death of his mother, and as her heir, the twenty-fourth Baron Le Despencer, and possessed a peerage which dates clear back to the reign of King John.

Modest in the person, and a most sympathetic friend, he is known in English society by the nickname of "the Star," a sobriquet that originated with a horse called "Star of India," which belonged to his father, and about which he was often talking to his brother officers.

How devoted he is to sport, and the extent to which he has inherited his father's fondness for racing, may be gathered from the fact that within an hour after calling on his father-in-law, he received a telegram to say that his father's horse "Dutch Oven," which had started as an extreme outsider, had won the St. Leger.

Lord Falmouth, besides serving through the Egyptian war which culminated in the battle of Tel-el-Kebir, commanded the Guards' Camel Regiment in the Nile expedition of 1884, and also the British forces at the battle of Metemma. He retired from the army some years ago with the rank of major-general, and now divides his time between racing, wireless telegraphy, and the management of his two great estates, Treghonau, where Marconi has his wireless station, and Mereworth.

Lord Falmouth never bets, and so firmly resolved has he always been to preserve free from stain his grand old family name of Boscawen, that when his brother Hugh got into financial difficulties some years ago he came forward to pay off in full the liabilities, thus saving the escutcheon of his house from the stigma of bankruptcy.

PAPER TRUST PROBE

United States and Canadian Makers Accused of Combining.
Washington, April 28.—John Norris of the New York Times today continued its testimony before the House special news print paper and wood pulp committee. His testimony related especially to the shutting down of paper mills to prevent competition, and he quoted from various newspapers in substantiation of his own statement.

A number of statements from publishers regarding their efforts to secure paper from Canadian mills were introduced by Mr. Norris evidently for the purpose of showing that there was an understanding between the Canadian mills and the mills in the United States. One instance related was that of a publisher in Chicago who had heard of a Canadian agent who was offering a better price on paper than could be secured in the United States, but who was found to have raised his price and then left town. Mr. Norris was unable to give statistics as to the Canadian mills which had been closed, but understood that some had been. In this connection he was questioned by Mr. Mann as to why, if the Canadian mills were being closed and paper was so high the publishers in United States had not seized the opportunity to
