ENTRANCE OF REGENTS

Unique and Impressive Ceremony the Republic of San Marino.

London, April 21. - Twice a year, on April 1 and Oct. 1, an old and picturrepublic of San Marino, when the two regents, or captains of the commonwealth, assume office.

The mode of election of the two regents, who in the statutes of 1200 are styled consuls and in the latter statutes defenders or captains, and the formall date from the year 1224. On March 15 and Sept. 15 of every year the names of welve members of the grand council of the republic are drawn by iot and each of these nominators must designate a person worthy to be charged with the government. The twelve names are submitted to council and a vote is taken on each

The names of the six candidates who have the largest number of votes are then written down in couples on three pieces of paper, which are placed in an urn. The urn is then carried to the cathedral, escorted by a guard honor, and all the members of council, headed by the regents, and after mass has been celebrated and special prayers said a boy draws from the urn one slip of paper, and the names written on it are those of the new regents, who must accept office or pay a fine of \$100 and be declared traitors

to their country.
On the day they assume office they tre escorted to the Palazzo Valloni, where the majordomo introduces into their presence the religious, civil and nilitary authorities. Then the two rerents, surrounded by the noble guards with drawn swords, proceed to the state palace, where they are received by the old regents, who join in the procession and go to the cathedral. High mass and a Te Deum are sung, and the precession returns to the palace, where speeches are made by the rector of the university and by the youngest student, who both exhort the new re-
