Winnipeg Investigation Will Probably Be Brought to a Close on Saturday.

FARMER WAS HURLED FROM LOAD OF HAY

William Scott, of West Williams, Was Very Badly Injured.

Parkhill, Dec. 8.—Mr. William Scott, of con. 18, of West Williams, met with an accident yesterday, which, it is feared, may result seriously. He was engaged in drawing hay to the Hastings House barn, and was nearing one of the doors, when the wagon slewed, throwing the load to one side, and Mr. Scott off on the other. Mr. Scott alighted on his head and was picked up in an unconscious condition. It was found that he had sustained serious injury to the head and that his left knee-cap was also badly injured. He was removed to his home, where Dr. Wilson attended him.

THAT SANATORIUM GRANT MAY YET GO THROUGH

County Councillors Told of the Excellent Results Attained By Institution.

Hon. Adam Beck yesterday afternoon addressed the county council on the Byron Sanatorium, when the matter of making a \$4,000 grant to that institution was again brought up. While the members of the council objected to being criticised because of the course they adopted at the June session, it was apparent that the matter had been very satisfactorily explained, and it is thought that the grant will go through, although some discussion is anticipated.

A Good Work.
Mr. Beck cited a number of instances to show the great work being done by the London Health Association, and declared that in all his experience he had never seen the people enter into any project so wholeheartedly and enthusiastically. Mr. Beck stated that the sanatorium is already recognized as an ideal institution, and within a few years the backbone of consumption in this district will have been broken, as it is in Hamilton today. In that city the death rate is now but 30 to 32, as compared with as high as 70 and 75 a couple of years ago.

There is at present a man at the sanatorium who failed to show improvement at Weston. In six weeks he gained twelve pounds, and is now able to assist in light work about the farm. Another case, that of a woman, who was thought to have reached the incurable stage, is cited. She entered the sanatorium, when it was first opened, and has picked up wonderfully. She is now practically cured, and will be able to return to her home in St. Thomas for Christmas. Her weight has increased 21 pounds since she arrived at Byron. Another St. Thomas girl had taken on four and a half pounds in two weeks. A woman who resides in a village not far from London has had an affection of the throat for years. Her condition was very bad, but while she has only been at the sanatorium four days her condition is greatly improved.

County Patients.
There are now several county patients in the institution, but thus far no charity has been asked. No patient, curable or incurable, has ever been refused admittance. Dr. Osler recently declared that there is no incurable case of tuberculosis, the stages now being classed as incipient and advanced. The institution is in very fair shape.

financially, and by next year it is expected that it will be entirely free of debt.

The nurse to be employed by the board of education will work in conjunction with the authorities, and conditions in the homes will be greatly improved, it is expected.

Mr. Beck declared that it is terrible to think that there is no law classing tuberculosis as an infectious disease. Every home, he said, should be thoroughly fumigated when a consumptive leaves it, in order to protect the innocent man, who brings his family into such a trap. He cited the case of a Calgary bank manager who was removed to Brockville and who occupied such a house. Both he and his wife are now in a sanatorium at Saranac.

AFRAID OF AIRSHIPS.

Berlin, Dec. 8.—Steps to guard German defenses from the espionage of aviators were taken today by the ministry of war,

which issued regulations on the subject. Aeroplanes and airships are prohibited from sailing above or within ten kilometres of the fortresses without a written permit from the military authorities.

Offenders will be arrested upon landing and treated as suspected spies, being searched for photographs and drawings of the fortifications.

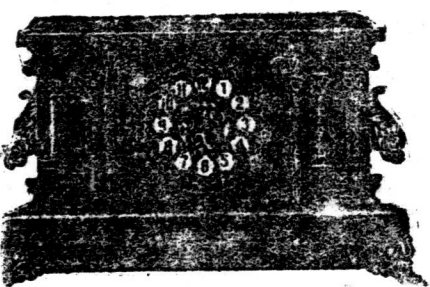
