Cut to Pieces in St. Thomas Yards

St. Thomas, Sept. 16.—Stewart McTaggart, a Michigan Central fireman, was fatally injured in the yards to-night, and died a few hours later at the hospital. Mr. McTaggart was found with both legs cut off close to the trunk, his arm crushed, and the lower part of his body badly torn. Mr. McTaggart was on his way to the roundhouse to take his engine, of No. 10 express, out on its regular run, when, it is thought, the locomotive of the Wolverine, which had been un-

coupled, was backing down through the yards and came upon him. Mr. McTaggart was in his 29th year, and resided with his widowed mother. He is survived by his brother, John L., of St. Thomas, and sisters, Miss Nellie, St. Thomas; Mrs. B. Richards, Lambeth; Mrs. B. Lawrence, Thamesville, and Miss Sadie, Detroit. The remains were removed to the undertaking establishment of P. R. Williams & Son, and later to his mother's home on Hughes street.

SOME FINE HORSES AT WESTERN FAIR

A Few of Those Who Won
Prizes at the Big Show.

There were some fine specimens of horseflesh on exhibition at the Fair. John Coventry, Woodstock, showed a fine string of thoroughbreds, winning first, third and fourth in brood mares; first on 3-year-old filly; first on 2-year-old gelding; first on suckling; first on aged stallion; third in Hon. Adam Beck's special; sweepstake ribbon for mare any age, open to all. He owns Victoria Coventry, the fastest mare in Canada, holding the track record since 1904. Bawden and Mossip, St. Marys, showed a fine string of Clydes. Wm. Hogg & Son, Thamesford, won well in hackney and carriage classes. Leiper & Moon, London, showed first on aged stallion (imported). This horse won first in Glasgow. S. J. Prouse, Ingersoll, won one first, one second, and one third in Clydesdales. G. A. Attridge, Chatham, won first on Clydesdale brood mare; fourth on suckling foal, and fourth on yearling colt. Wm. McGhee, Beachville, won first on Clydesdale team, and several other prizes.

Capt. Tom Robson showed a very fine 3-year-old stallion, winning first and champion ribbon. Alex. F. McNeven, St. Thomas, won fourth on 2-year-old stallion in the Clydesdale class; also second on Shire stallion, and champion ribbon on Clydesdale mare; also first in open class; second on 1-year-old filly; first on 2-year-old filly, and second on Clydesdale team to win.

Charles F. Heidt, Frome, won third Clydesdale team; McGhee, Beachville, won first Clydesdale team. Dan Murray, Bennington, took first on Heavy Draft team. Hamilton & Son, Simcoe, made a fine display in Percherons, winning four firsts, one second, one third; also first on German Coach.

J. H. Banbury, Dereham, won a few prizes on Shire stallions. Mr. Cox, Brantford, won first on Shetland pony on line, and second in harness.

U. S. AND NEWFOUNDLAND

Washington Seeking Reciprocity
Regarding Fisheries.

St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 17.—Bound on a mission which is generally looked upon as a re-opening of the reciprocity issue between the United States and Newfoundland, following the promulgation of the Hughes fisheries decision, Professor Chas. M. Pepper, a United States tariff expert, has arrived here from Washington, N. H., to have a conference shortly with Premier Morris. At this meeting it is believed an informal discussion will be had regarding the fisheries question, and several other principal industries of Newfoundland in which the United States is interested.

RELIGION IN WIFE'S NAME

London Pastor to Hamilton Young
Men Who Stay Away From Church.

Hamilton, Sept. 17.—A scathing criticism of men who had all their religious life in their wife's name was given in St. Aubrey Avenue Baptist Church on Thursday night by Rev. H. Bingham, of London. His address was in connection with the opening of the new church. Rev. Mr. Bingham expressed the opinion that it was the leisure time they had on their hands that was sending so many young men to the bad; he thought places of amusement should be provided where they could find a pleasant and profitable time awaiting them.

CABLED GREETINGS

British Journalists Send Message to
Canadian Newspaper Men.

Montreal, Sept. 17.—The British Institute of Journalists, now in session in London, England, cabled fraternal greetings to the Canadian newspaper men with hopes for a furtherance of the profession for the best interests of the empire. Sir Hugh Graham, recently elected a vice-president of the institute, replied for Canadian journalists: "I am sure the Canadian journalists appreciate the kind greetings of the British Institute of Journalists, and fully reciprocate, with best wishes for the success of the conference and the extension of the institute's influence and usefulness."

CITY'S WIRES ARE TOO NEAR BELL'S

Manager Beard Notifies Water
Commissioners That Damages
Will Be Looked For.

CITY WANTS VAN CLEVE

Engineer Will Be Entreated to Come
to London as Soon as Possible—
Meeting Friday Night.

At the meeting of the water commissioners last evening, Manager Dark submitted a communication to the board, asking that Mr. Van Cleve, chief engineer, be brought to the city as soon as possible, as there were some matters of considerable importance that he desired to take up with him.

Chairman Pocock stated that both he and Mayor Beattie had written to Mr. Van Cleve, asking him to come as soon as he could, and had received word that he was still in the hands of his physician, but he would come as soon as possible.

Trouble Over Wires.
Mr. C. H. Beard, manager of the Bell Telephone Company, wrote that the transmission line was in close proximity to their wires in several places, and there was great danger to the company. He notified the city that the company would hold the corporation liable for damages.

Manager Dark stated that there was some danger in a few places, but nothing serious. As the construction work was being completed, the danger was being reduced to the minimum. The communication was filed.

London Electric. Regarding the London Electric power matter will be taken up with the city solicitor by Chairman Pocock and Mayor Beattie and it is expected that some arrangement will be arrived at. The Vulcan Iron Company wrote, stating that they could not furnish 18 ornamental street lighting poles a week. The chairman will take the matter up with them.

Engineer's Report.
The pumping engineer's report showed that the daily average for the last half of August was 3,900,000 gallons of water. The reservoir never contained less than 12 feet of water. Those present at the meeting were Chairman Phillip Pocock, Commissioners Fred J. Darch, William Wyatt, Mayor Beattie, Manager Dark and Secretary Ellwood.

GREAT SHOOTING
Dreadnoughts Demolish Imaginary
Enemy in Fast Time.

Portsmouth, Eng., Sept. 17.—There was a new development in gunnery practice by the home fleet today, it being a practice by the Dreadnoughts. The target, an elaborate lattice work affair, 90 feet long by 30 feet high, was towed by the Dreadnoughts. A dreadnought squadron, steaming at the rate of 16 knots, opened fire simultaneously at a distance of five miles, and demolished the target in three minutes. Other warships carried out the same practice under varying conditions with similar success.

LARSEN'S FOOL TRIP
Will Attempt to Go Through the
Whirlpool Rapids Tomorrow.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 17.—Capt. Klaus Larsen has postponed his trip through the Whirlpool Rapids until tomorrow afternoon, when it is expected there will be a large Sunday crowd on hand to witness the perilous trip. Larsen will not be allowed to start from the Canadian landing of the Maid of the Mist, as the trip is prevented by Inspector W. H. Mains, of the Ontario police, who will have officers on hand. "If an attempt is made to start from this side he can be prosecuted for attempted suicide," said the inspector. "He will not be allowed to attempt such an undertaking, where they endanger their lives," said the chief this morning, hence Larsen will be compelled to start from the American side, as did Peter Nissen, of Chicago, who successfully went through the rapids.

THE AIR DERBY

Great Balloon Race Starts From St.
Louis Today.

[Associated Press.]
Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 17.—Favorable atmospheric conditions were predicted for the American championship and free-for-all balloon races, which were scheduled to start at 3 p.m. from the Indianapolis motor speedway, with thirteen entrants.

Pilot John Berry, of St. Louis, who won the American championship race last year in the balloon "University City," has entered the free-for-all race. He had a new air craft under construction for the big race, but as it was not completed, he declined to enter the old balloon in the championship contest. He had intended taking a St. Louis newspaper woman on the trip as aide, but her employers refused their consent.

Reduction in Hours of Work Is
Very Popular.

A very enthusiastic meeting of the employees of the McCormick Manufacturing Company was held last evening at 5:30, Mr. Thomas Duff being in the chair.

The meeting was called in order to express to the firm in some way the appreciation of the employees of the recent reduction of hours in work and other changes that have been inaugurated of late for their comfort and benefit.

After a thorough discussion, in which it was pointed out that one firm in the city had already followed the example of the firm, the hope was expressed that other manufacturers would all fall in line.

A committee was appointed to draw up a suitable resolution and have it engrossed and framed and presented to the firm.

BOTHA FELT BAD

Became Livid When Informed of His
Defeat.

London, Sept. 17.—The report that General Botha, now that he has been defeated in Pretoria, will resign the premiership is not confirmed. After the poll was declared announcing his defeat the premier showed signs of feeling the humiliation keenly. He was completely unstrung, and for some minutes was speechless and livid. Minister of Commerce Moor has been defeated, making three ministers who have lost seats.

There is consternation among the Nationalists. The result of the elections terminates the rule of the Extremists, and strikes a deathblow at "Hertzogism." The Unionist majorities are expected to be re-elected.

The standing of the parties now is—Nationalists 52, Unionists 36, Laborites 4, and Independents 10.

RESCUED FROM FALLS

Hamilton Girl Had a Narrow Escape
at Niagara.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Sept. 17.—Nellie Galt, 11 years old, daughter of Mrs. Agnes Galt, of Hamilton, who was visiting relatives, was saved from the rapids above the Falls this afternoon by Joe Maronella, a chauffeur, who heard the little girl's screams, and ran to her assistance. With her mother and a little girl about 4 years old, who was in a go-cart, Nellie set out for a walk on the reservation. They walked up the river to a point behind the Cataract house, where the child attempted to cross a plank that spans a disused railway. She had hardly set foot upon it before she lost her balance and fell into the water. She grasped a log that spans the railway and hung there screaming. Maronella was coming over the Goat Island bridge with his machine, when he heard the cries. He put on top speed and soon reached the scene. With some difficulty he drew the little girl, whose body was dangling in the water, in and turned her over to Officer Levee.
