

The Springbank dam, equipped to furnish power for the waterworks pumps at Springbank, ha > been practically out of service for many months. General Manager Glaubitz maintains that the pumps are not fit for service without many improvements. On the other hand, Mr. William Yeates, who installed the pumps, says the repairs required are only ordinary, and that for a small outlay the pumps would develop several hundred horsepower, with a saving of thousands of dollars to the city.
