FINAL SET-TO FOR CITY HOCKEY TITLE TONIGHT

Feds and University Teams Are Both Confident of Winning—Collegians Have Three-Goal Advantage—Same Teams As Monday Will Be Used.

The final game in the city series to settle the claim between the Western University and Feds teams as to which is the better aggregation, will be played tonight in the Princess rink. The collegians have the jump on the outsiders as a result of piling up a three-goal lead on Monday night in the first game. This handicap will give the Feds all the more fighting spirit and determination to win out. They claim, and they are out to beat the students tonight. They are taking the game seriously and making every effort to be in shape to win out tonight is evidenced from the fact that they sent a scout team to Waterloo last night to fill their scheduled fixture in the consolation series. All the regulars stayed at home and practiced for tonight's game.

Collegians Confident.
The university team is equally confident that it can repeat Monday night's victory. The players feel sure that their three-goal lead will not be reduced a bit by the Feds tonight. There is little difference in the two rinks, and the change in playing sur-

faces will likely cut little figure in the outcome. It will be a struggle between speed and combination, on the one hand and solid back-checking and individual work on the other. The Feds have never shown up very strong on combination, while the university manages to work it once in a while. Individual brilliancy will likely cut the biggest figure.

Some Line-Ups.
The teams will line up the same as on Monday night. The Feds showed a great deal of improvement in their game, and if they develop any team play and show a little stronger work on the defence they will give the students a hard game. Hall may be on the defence tonight for the students. Tom Munro will in all probability handle the game.

Following the game, the Western University team will catch a train at midnight for Chicago on its way to Duluth, where it plays Friday and Saturday. It is not likely the players will arrive back in London again for a week, as they intend playing Fort William and some of the Northern Ontario teams before returning.

Owner of Ontarios Is Introducing O.R.F.U. Methods Into Hockey.

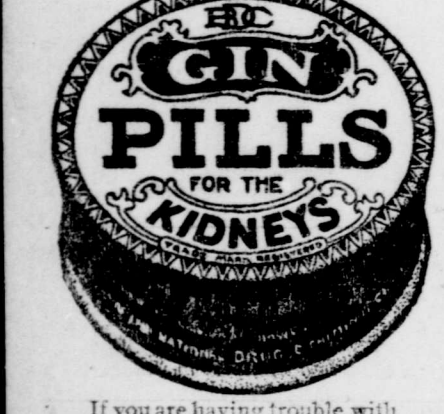

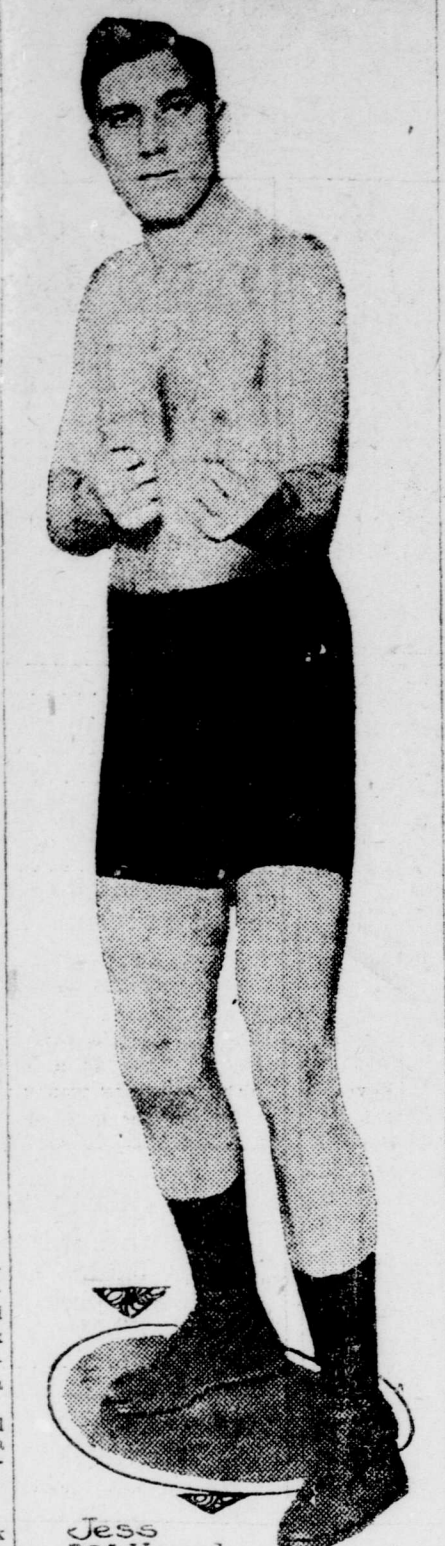

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CANADIAN LEAGUE WILL BE REDUCED TO SIX CLUBS

Erie and Peterboro Will Be Cities Dropped—Meeting Being Held Friday in Toronto To Deal With Matter—President Fitzgerald Favors Six Teams.

The Canadian League will hold a special meeting on Friday afternoon, and according to President Fitzgerald, the club-owners will have to consider the question of a reduction in the number of teams. The Peterboro Club has practically decided to suspend for the coming season. The owners there have faced a big deficit for the past three seasons, and an effort to raise enough money to carry the team through this season has failed. The owners have now asked the league's permission to carry the franchise for a year without playing.

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
