INDOOR TRACK MEET ALSO PLANNED FOR ARMORIES

Committees On Five Sports Render Glowing Reports of Prospects This Year—Date Limit Set At Dec. 1.

SPORTS—The indoor track meet, boxing, hockey, basketball and track events met last night and reported back to the general executive of the Garrison A. A. at a later meeting, bright prospects for each of the sports they represented.

A boxing tournament and a track meet early in January are two certainties, with the rest of the leagues starting work on their schedules right away.

Last night a time limit was set for players, a motion picture showing that every man competing should be a bona fide member of the unit he represents by December 1. Last year the limit was November 15, but owing to the fact that some of the units' ranks had been somewhat depleted through members leaving the city, and others are just organizing, an extra two weeks was thought necessary.

Capt. Blake Jones of the Machine Gunners, chairman of the hockey committee, was able to report a possibility of at least six teams, and the secretary, Capt. Phillips was instructed to ask permission of O. C. R. S. for the use of the big rink on the barracks square at Carling Heights, which will be constructed again this year.

Staff Sergeant Sheard suggested that a track meet be staged early in January and reported that another meeting of the committee would be held shortly to arrange more details of getting away to start. Glennie had practically every unit in the Garrison to report an entrance to the indoor baseball league, with eight teams in. The indoor people will stage their games on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and have fixed on \$10 as a fee for teams entering. This committee will meet again next Tuesday night to arrange other details of getting away to a start. Barney Dunlevy, Bob Wray, Corker Legg, A. T. Taylor, Ed Walker and Butler of the Y. will be asked to officiate as referees.

Sgt. Burns, chairman of the boxing committee, said that five units were represented at the meeting and more had stated their intention of producing a series of boxing and wrestling for the tournaments. The committee will meet next Monday night and tentative arrangements for the first tournament in January made.

Basketball will have entrants from four or five units, with the possibility of Western University, C. O. T. C. having two teams in. Deputy P. R. C. E. was chairman of this committee.

They ought to drop the name Argo and just call them the Conachers instead.

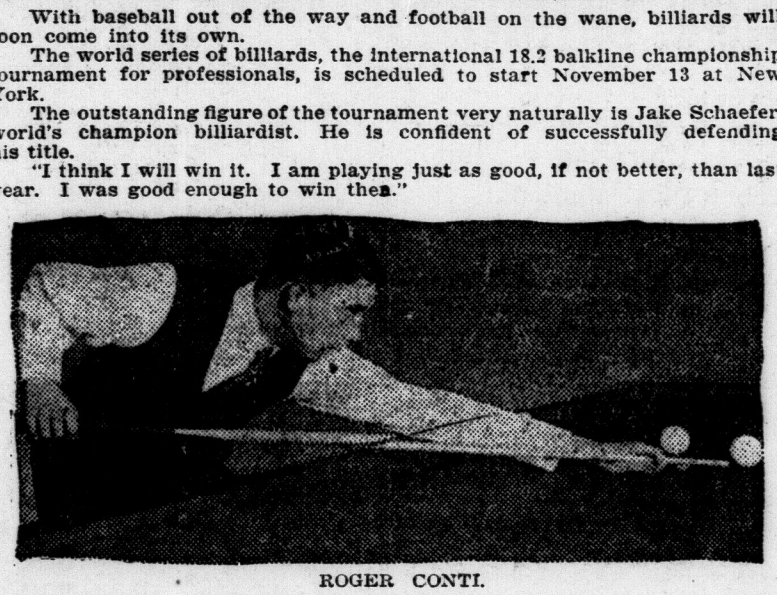
