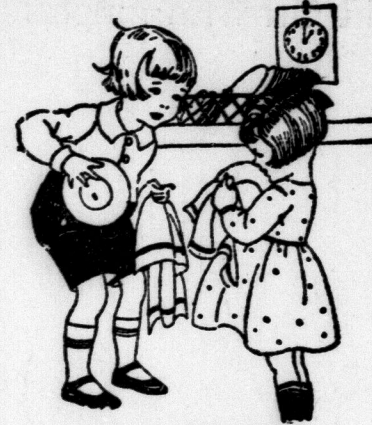

No. 1094—A useful Christmas suggestion that can be made at home in spare hours. Pattern cuts in one size only and requires 1 yard 36-inch material with 1-4 yard 4-inch lace. Transfer Pattern No. 606—in blue only—15c extra.

No. 1094—A neat and attractive morning dress that is quite simple to make. Pattern cuts in sizes 36, 38, 40, 42, 44, 46 and 48 inches bust measure. Size 36 requires 4-4 yards 36-inch material with 7-8 yard 36-inch contrasting.
