PROSPECTS FINE, BEAL DECLARES

COURSE ATTRACTS

Advance registration at the Technical High School commenced last evening. Today Principal H. B. Beal reported a very gratifying response. "We'll have an even greater first-year class than last year," Mr. Beal told The Advertiser. "We had 330 first-year students last term, and the advance registration last night is greater than ever and would indicate a much larger enrollment."

The office of the Technical High School will be open on Thursday and Saturday evenings between the hours of 7:30 and 9:30 o'clock for new registrations. On Saturday morning the office will be open from 9 to 12 for registration of county pupils.

"The one-year commercial course for Collegiate students is immensely popular," the principal commented. "It is for matriculation students who have had a year of high school. AGED FARMER CHARGES NEIGHBOR BEAT HIM

John O'Brien Committed For Trial After Row Over Line Fence.

Claiming that he had been severely beaten by John O'Brien, a farmer living on the Longwoods road near Melbourne, George Marshment, aged 70, barred his battered arm and showed his bruised eye and thigh to the magistrate at Glenora yesterday in support of the charges.

O'Brien, whose farm adjoins Marshment's, was charged with doing bodily harm to the latter, and was committed for trial after the preliminary hearing. Later he was released on \$2,000 bail.

According to evidence submitted in court, members of the O'Brien family had just completed building a line fence on their property when Mr. Marshment, several lacerations on his face and one on his arm, came into the O'Brien grounds. O'Brien, noticing the old man, is alleged to have picked up a club and hit Marshment, knocking him down. As a result of his injuries, the doctor who attended the plaintiff declared that the latter cannot raise his arm and that severe lacerations had been inflicted on other parts of his body.

The alleged assault is the result of a long quarrel over a small piece of property which both men are said to have claimed. Marshment, giving evidence, appeared to be in a very weakened condition. There were deep gashes about his face and one of his arms had been rendered useless.

FIVE THOUSAND CANADIANS HAVE RETURNED MONTHLY

Total of 18,000 Returns in Last Quarter of the Year.

WERE BORN HERE

Immigrants To Enter Dominion in Same Period Reaches 64,023.

Nearly five thousand Canadians have been coming back to this country from the United States in each of the last four months, according to a report from Ottawa. The exact figures are: April, 4,087; May, 4,936; June, 4,720, and July, 5,127.

During these four months a total of 64,923 immigrants came into the country and in the same period over 18,000 Canadians returned from the United States. Of these, 16,166 were Canadian-born citizens, 1,146 were British, and 1,655 were naturalized Canadian citizens.

July's total of immigration into Canada, which was 17,783, was a decrease of 23 per cent from the same month last year, while the total of 64,923 for the four months ending July 31 was an increase of 17 per cent over the corresponding period last year. Of the total for the four months, 32,248 were British, 7,005 were from the United States, and 25,770 were from other countries. For July this year, 4,789 were British, and 4,416 from other countries. There has been the usual seasonal falling off of immigration into Canada during the summer months, entries for April being the high mark, with 19,330, which was an increase of 103 per cent over the same month in 1923.

Crew On Dredge Declines Rescue

Associated Press Despatch. Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 27.—The government dredge Orozal, with 80 men on board, which was stranded on South Bars, a half-mile from shore, and was not expected to weather the impassable breakers, swept shoreward by a 66-mile gale, late yesterday was in less danger as the violence of the storm had abated.

The crew remained on board, refusing to take advantage of the line thrown by coast guards. Efforts to float the dredge will be made at high tide, it was said.

POLICE STRIKE WILL BE PROBED

Victoria Government Proposes To Appoint Royal Commission.

Associated Press Despatch. Melbourne, Australia, Aug. 27.—The government of Victoria proposes to appoint a royal commission to inquire into the Melbourne police strike of last autumn and also a commission to look into the question of the settlement of soldiers in the state, according to an announcement made by G. M. Prendergast, at the opening meeting of the Victoria General Assembly yesterday. Mr. Prendergast outlined the government's policy, and in connection therewith made the announcement as to the proposed royal commissions. Other proposals of the new premier included the establishing of an agricultural bank and the formation of a compulsory wheat pool.

"The Victoria government," Premier Prendergast announced, "had agreed to allow the Australian federal government to raise all the loans required by the state."

The police strike referred to by Premier Prendergast at the opening of the Victoria Legislature, occurred near the end of October last and continued for several days. The strike was precipitated by the alleged spying methods of the senior officer of the police supervisors, nicknamed "Spooks," whom the men wished removed from office. During the strike, Melbourne, the capital city of Victoria, was for a time practically an armed camp, and rioting of more or less serious nature occurred, about 10 persons being injured in the riots.

Duchess Seeks To Retain Home

Brings Legal Action To Restrain Ejection From House.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Aug. 27.—The domestic affairs of the Duchess of Westminister were aired in court yesterday, when the duchess, who sailed for the United States on the S.S. Majestic this morning, brought action through her lawyers, for an injunction to restrain the duke, or his servants, or agents, from ejecting her from her home, No. 10, Berkeley Square, which is just a few blocks away from Grosvenor House, the duke's London home. The duchess, who is a member of the aristocracy, has been in the house for many years. She has brought this action because she feels that her rights as a duchess are being infringed upon by the duke's actions.

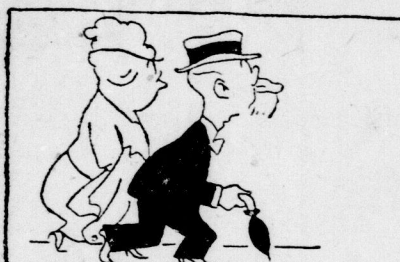

Oshawa Schemes For Replacement of Monument in 500 Years.

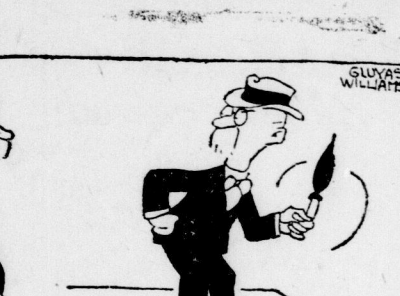

Historic School Chime Will Live On, Is Verdict

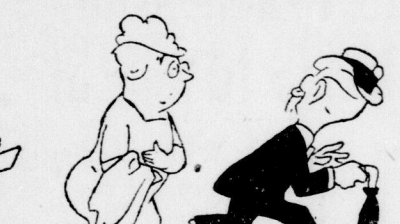

Miss Mary Hoskin Receives Honor For Services to Church.

Toronto, Aug. 27.—Miss Mary Hoskin, of Toronto, president of the Women's Auxiliary of the Catholic Church Extension Society of Canada, has been decorated by His Holiness Pope Pius XI with the cross pro ecclesia et pontifice, an honor bestowed on those who have especially merited it on account of service for the church and the pope.

Miss Hoskin is the second woman in Canada to receive this mark of distinction. BIGGEST "SUCKERS" ARE NEW YORKERS

So States Eddie Jackson, Publicity Manager For the Sparks Circus.

KNOW "BUFFALO BILL"

The late William Cody, better known as "Buffalo Bill," was the finest man the world ever produced; Kid McCoy was the biggest hearted individual that ever stepped into a prize ring, and Jess Willard was the poorest fighter that ever became champion of the world.

So says Eddie Jackson, publicity manager for the Sparks Circus, which showed here today. Mr. Jackson handled publicity for William Cody, Kid McCoy, Jess Willard, Frank Gotch, and scores of other persons who have achieved world notoriety in one way or another. Like the famous Barnum, Mr. Jackson believes there is "one born every minute."

"You don't find the suckers so numerous in the small towns," Mr. Jackson explained, "but they are as thick as dust in the large cities. The greatest gull on earth is the chap who lives on Park avenue, New York, and works on 42nd street."

To have been an intimate friend of Buffalo Bill is a privilege which a man should cherish all his life. He was the finest fellow that ever lived. No man that I came in contact with approached perfection to such an extent as old man Cody. One day we were stranded in the country, and Bill, who was crazy over tobacco, had chewed the end of a cigar, and sent one of his employees a distance of fourteen miles to get some. While he was gone, I was looking for a tramp to smoke. I asked for a change of tobacco, and he sent me a tin of it. When the messenger came back Bill gave the tramp every bit, in spite of his own craving for it. That's only a small illustration of Mr. Cody's fine spirit toward his fellowmen."

Contrary to the generally accepted stories, pugilists, show people, and performers lead clean, upright lives as a rule, Mr. Jackson said. They have to be declared, because their vocations demand it. Kid McCoy was one of the biggest hearted men that ever lived, and Jackson believes that his present predicament, involving a charge of murder, could only have developed when McCoy was terribly drunk.

"McCoy wouldn't hurt a fly if it dirtied his boots," Jackson declared. "He actually murdered the woman he is accused of murdering, he must have been temporarily insane." In 1907 Mr. Jackson became a movie actor for the Stage-Viscaya Company of Chicago. This was the first movie concern in the world, and a business long before moving picture making became a monopoly of California. If he had any idea of the tremendous expansion which latterly took place in moving pictures, he would have continued as an actor. But he believed at the time that movies were a passing fad. Mr. Jackson knew Mr. Barnum Jumbo, the elephant. He was killed by a train at St. Louis. He was also a friend of Weber and Fields, Lillian Russell, John Drew, and other stage celebrities.

EDUCATION SURPLUS DECLARED PROBABLE
