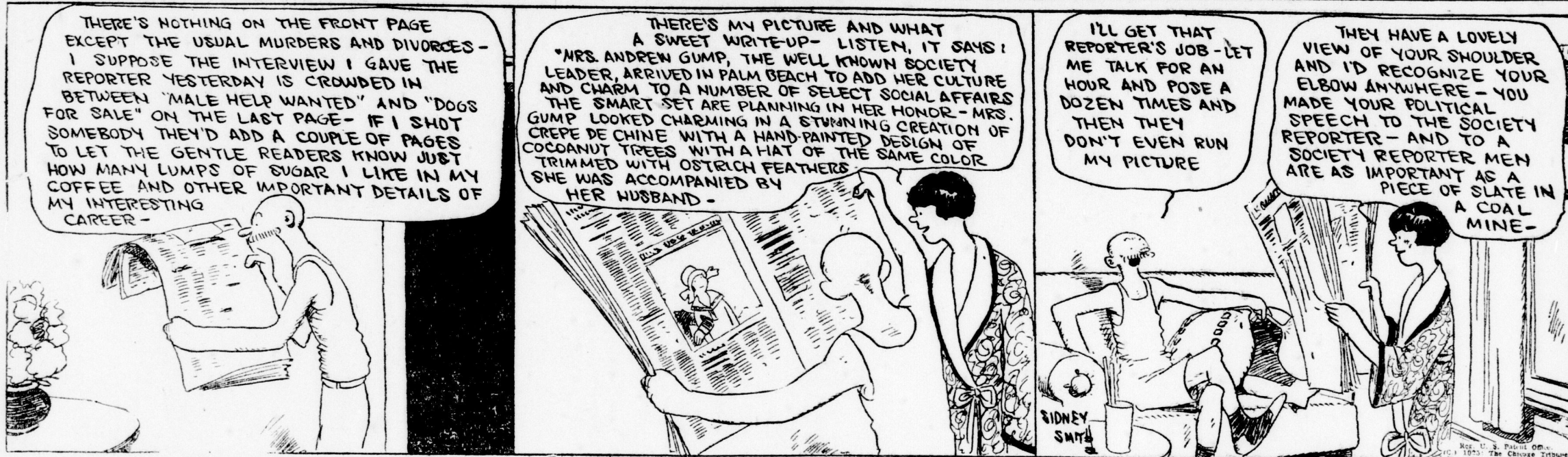

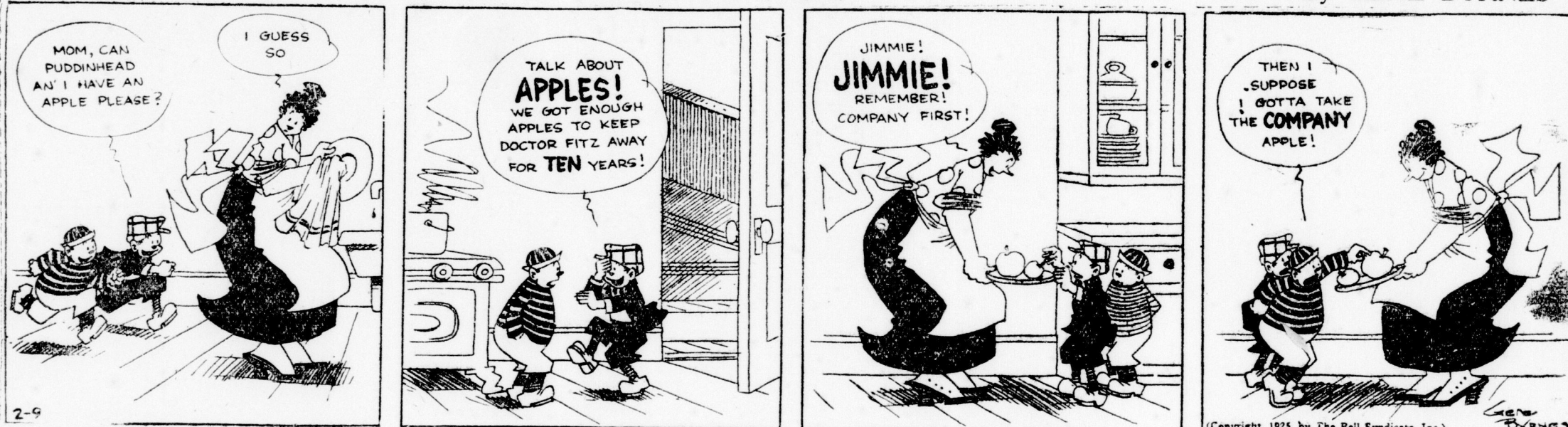

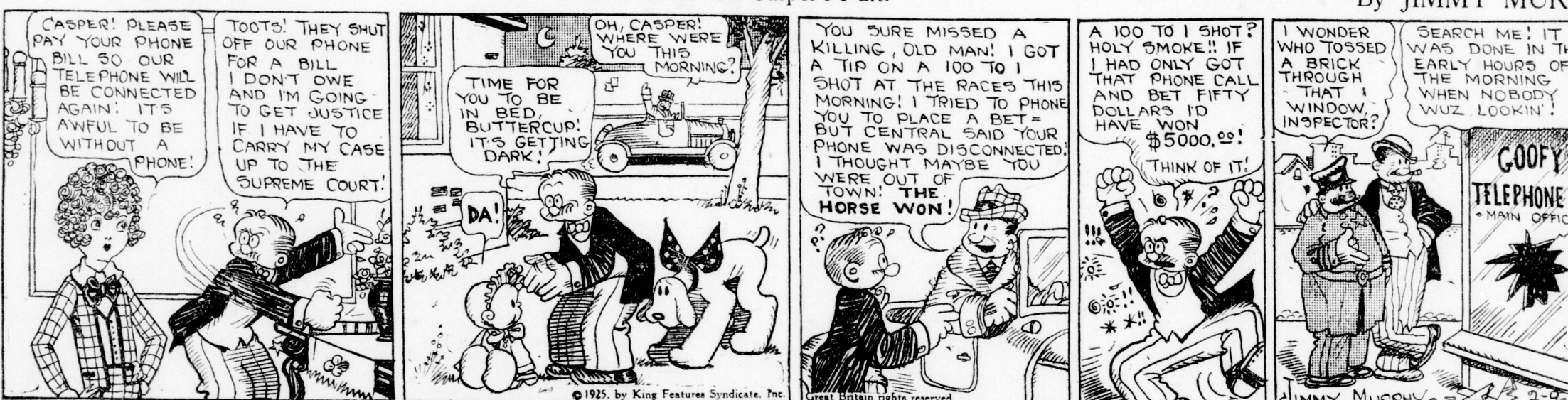

Convicts Board Locomotive and Smash Way To Freedom

Jackson, Mich., Feb. 8.—Boarding a small switch engine used in the Chelsea cement plant, five convicts made their escape from the Michigan state prison here late yesterday when they pulled the throttle wide open and sent the locomotive crashing through the iron gates guarding the plant. The five are still at liberty. The crash was heard by guards just as the 650 convicts in the big prison were entering the mess hall for their evening meal. While some herded the prisoners into the building, others rushed for the opening in the gates to forestall any effort by the main body of the prisoners to make a break for freedom. The convicts who escaped were nearly all long-term men.

ALLEGED SLAYER IS SHOT TO DEATH

Carl Spano Was Awaiting Trial For Murder of Orville Atkinson, St. Thomas.

St. Thomas, Feb. 8.—Carl Spano, alleged to have shot down Orville Atkinson, a former resident of this city, on October 9 at the Roadside Inn, near Detroit, was himself killed by his father-in-law, Tony A. Marto, following an alleged attempt to "get even" by Spano. Saturday, Carlo Spano was to have appeared in circuit court to answer a charge of murdering Atkinson. On Friday evening, Spano returned to the residence of his father-in-law, which he had left the night previous following a quarrel, and was dropped with five bullet wounds in his body, fired by A. Marto. The latter gave himself up to the police, admitting that he fired the shots in self-defence. He had been living with his wife's people. Spano, 14-year-old daughter, a year ago, but was repulsed by her parents. Biding his time, he kidnapped the girl as she came from school one day and mar-
