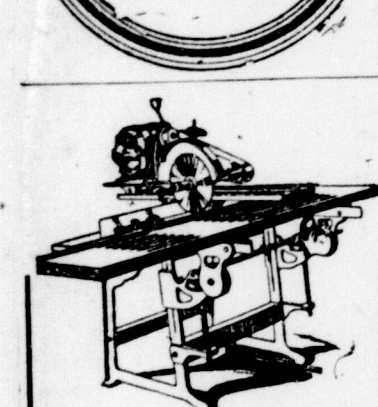

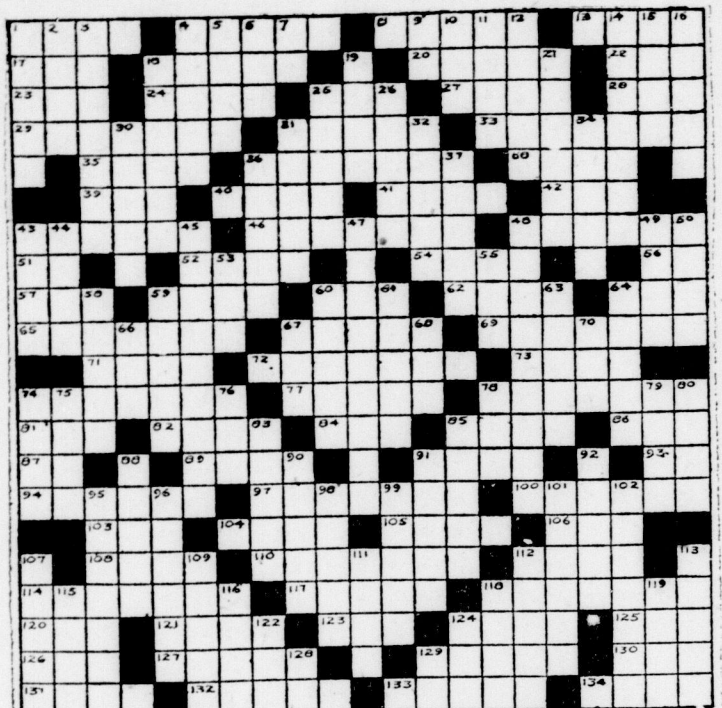
CROSS WORD PUZZLE NO. 47.

Each definition suggests a word possessing the exact number of letters to fit the white spaces allotted to it.

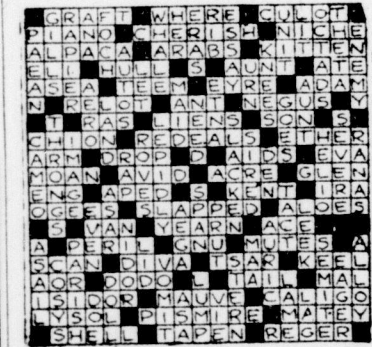
Each white space is to receive one letter only. Words start only in numbered squares.

WORK OF YOUNG PEOPLE EXPLAINED BY SPEAKER

Toronto University Student
Gives Talk at Knox Pres-
byterian Church.

Young people of Knox Presbyterian church last night took charge of the church service and offered interest to a large congregation of worshippers. Lew Little, St. Thomas, a medical student at the University of Toronto, told of the student volunteer movement. John Argo, president of the young people's organization of the church, was in charge with Norman Wiggman and Stewart Kennedy assisting.

Rev. T. A. Symington's sermon at the morning service dealt with the peoples who had rejected Christianity, even though they had every opportunity to understand God. But "Ye Would Not," was the minister's topic in dealing with the failures of these people. He declared that Christianity had become a religion of the Gentiles. Judas was one man who had been in close touch with Jesus Christ for three years and yet he had turned down his opportunities. The Bible explained that God had tried to lead every age in the way of progress, but man had many times baffled the plan of God by his unwillingness. During the service Mr. Symington announced the dates for two public meetings in the church to discuss union. On Dec. 16 Rev. Dr. D. T. McKerrill of Toronto will present the views of the anti-unionists, and on Dec. 18 Dr. D. C. McGregor will give the union side of the argument.

PASTOR UPHOLDS CADET MOVEMENT

Rev. G. T. Watts Declares
Organization Not For
Ambitious Militants.

That the school cadet movement is not for ambitious militants, but is to serve as a safety valve for the excessive joy and an outlet for the exuberant spirit amongst boys, was the declaration of Rev. George T. Watts, in his morning sermon yesterday at Wellington Street Methodist church. The occasion was the church parade of the Simcoe street public school cadets, who recently made Rev. Mr. Watts their chaplain.

Between 50 and 60 cadets were on parade and looked neat and trim in their Sam Brown belts and cadet hats as part of their parade dress. They were given a special place in the church, with Lieut. H. L. Secord, their instructor, and a number of their teachers on hand. There was a large attendance of members of the church congregation.

"The pleasures of sin" was the pastor's topic for his sermon on the 25th verse of the 11th chapter of Hebrews.

Boys and most everyone else needs some form of pleasure, Rev. Mr. Watts told his congregation. The mistake is not in seeking pleasure, but in seeking it under improper circumstances, unless boys misappropriated time during history or mathematical lessons to devote into plans for pleasure. There is some pleasure in sin, but no happiness. Happiness is enduring. Sinful pleasures are unsatisfying, are alloyed with disappointment and remorse and are prohibited by God.

Pleasures of sin are ruinous to life and character. The pastor told of the lives of some of the greatest men of history whose characters had been ruined by sinfulness. Rev. Mr. Watts closed with an appeal to the fathers to "chum up" with their boys.

ARCH MASONS HOLD ANNUAL SERVICE

Gathering Addressed by Rev.
A. S. H. Cree at Church
of Redeemer.

With over 400 lodgemen present, the annual church service of the Royal Arch Masons of London District No. 2 was held yesterday afternoon at the church of the Redeemer. Lodges represented were St. John, St. George, London and St. Andrew, with Rt. Ex. Companion Edwin Smith representing the grand council. R. E. Companion Richardson and Companion Ed. McNeill of Strathroy were present. Lodgemen acted as wardens and side-men.

Rt. Ex. Companion Rev. A. S. H. Cree, rector of the church, presided at a special sermon. Music was in charge of Companions Wm. Vaughan and T. Holman. Lessons were read by Rt. Wor. Bro. Burnie Smith, D.D.M., and Rt. Ex. Companion Edwin Smith, grand third principal. Shelley's "Saviors When the Night Invades" was chosen by the choir. The choir was in large numbers.

"Seek and ye shall find," (St. Luke xi: 9) was Rev. Mr. Cree's text for the afternoon, and the outstanding points of his discourse were labor faithfulness, revolution, and principle. Labor was the first step in life and without it there could be no success. Even in school work, where many things were learned that were afterwards seemingly discarded, those discarded studies had been beneficial. Acts of kindness were often prompted by early studies.

Many things are forgotten once they are learned, but once the principles of justice, righteousness, and mercy are put into practice they remain. They had persisted all down through the ages and Christians were confident that God was the same yesterday, today, and for all time to come. Without such principles, such an organization as the Masonic lodge could not exist.

Principles of the lodge, through labor and toil, were dedicated to the pursuit of the highest and best ideals of life. With those principles in general usage, there would be a standard amongst all men which would reward righteousness and eliminate grafting and falseness.

MALCOLM ASKS N. Y. TO BACK WATERWAY

Member For North Bruce
Speaks at Canadian Club
Luncheon.

New York, Dec. 6.—James Malcolm, member of the Canadian parliament, representing North Bruce, addressed the New York Canadian club at a luncheon today, and urged support for the St. Lawrence deep waterway project.

Mr. Malcolm outlined the benefits which would be derived by the United States and Canada through increased power and transportation facilities. As an example, he cited the success of the Ontario hydro-electric development and the resultant growth of industry in central Ontario.

The waterway, he said, had become an international necessity, adding: "If we are going to develop the central part of our two countries to the extent that it should be developed, we must support this great project."

**600 CHICKENS AND COOPS
DESTROYED BY FLAMES**

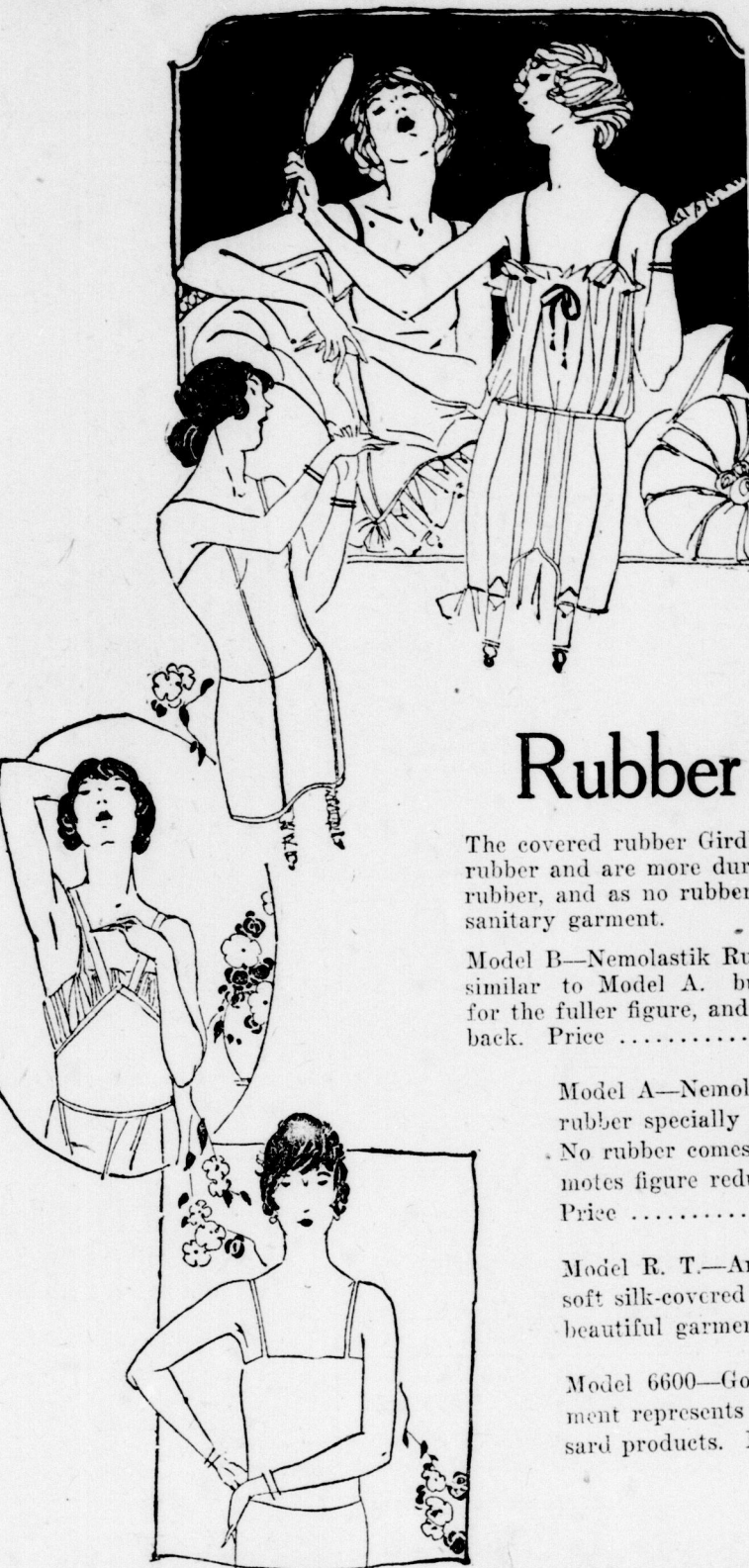
TO MAKE A SLIM FIGURE FOR

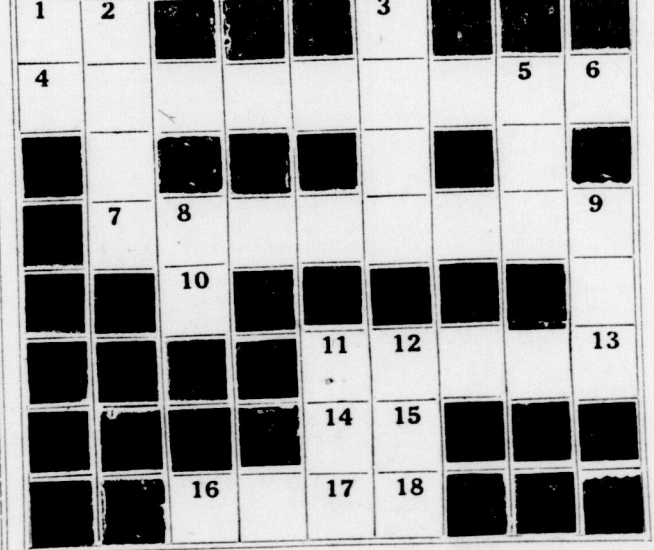
